HALT IN FEDERAL TAX SLASH STARTS ASSAULT ON PARTY

Democratic Leader Accuses
G. O. P. of Purposely
Waiting Year of
Election.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, June 7.—The senate took time out today to discuss the possibility of another tax reduction.

Asked by Senator Copeland, Democrat, New York, why the Republican majority was taking no steps toward a reduction, Chairman Smoot of the finance committee said surplus revenues did not warrant it. The Democratic floor leader, Senator Robinson of Arkansas, rejoined that the administration was reserving further reductions until the presidential year 1928, for political purposes.

Senator Copeland said he had been told the treasury would have a surplus of \$250,000,000 on July 1, next, and \$362,000,000 on July 1, 1927, but Senator Smoot replied that these amounts would be reduced to \$67,000,000 and \$11,000,000, respectively, by the estimated reductions in revenues made effective by the 1925 tax law.

The finance committee chairman added that any present estimates as to receipts and expenditures in 1927 were too uncertain to be used as the basis for tax reductions now.

The revenue depends mainly upon a prosperous nation, he said, and large losses had been suffered in stock values during the past three years.

Declaring that the situation demonstrated the "habitual inaccuracy of the estimates of the treasury department in respect to revenues and expenditures," Senator Robinson said when the 1926 revenue act was under consideration, "we were told we dare not eliminate our taxes now in force" because of the danger of a deficit.

"Now it appears," he added, "that we might have gone some further than we did go without bringing about a deficit."

Senator Simmons, Democrat, North Carolina, predicted a surplus of about \$250,000,000 for the present fiscal year.

Loiz, who is said to carry the highest degree awarded any mining engineer in the state, has had half a life time of experience in this work. 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80 MINERS RESCUED FROM GAS FUMES IN OHIO CEMENT PLANT

FRONTON, Ohio, June 7.—The last of eight miners overtaken by gas in the mine of the Alpha Portland Cement plant here today were rescued three hours after they had entered the mine.

Officials were unable to account for the accumulation of gas. On reaching the workings this morning, the men began to lose consciousness. Those nearest the shaft left the mine and reported the condition and a rescue crew was hurriedly organized.

GRANTS PASS MAY FACE INJUNCTION SUIT OVER SEWER

Game Warden Notifies City
Rogue River Pollution
Would Be Violation
of State Law.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

GRANTS PASS, Ore., June 7.—Injunction proceedings may be started against the city of Grants Pass to prevent the construction of a new sewer system which was planned to dump sewage into Rogue river, it was indicated in a letter received by the mayor from Game Warden E. F. Averill.

Bonds were voted at a recent election to build a new trunk system, to replace the present system, which has been outgrown. Although the present system dumps into the river, the game warden stated that construction of the new sewer would be enjoined unless some action is taken to insure building of a disposal plant.

Grants Pass city officials will go ahead with their arrangements for the sale of the bonds with the belief that assurance can be given that a disposal plant will be added as soon as the financing can be arranged. The plan adopted at spring includes the construction of this plant at some future time, but it was believed that bonds could not be voted if the whole amount were included at one time.

Two members of the game commission, and Mr. Averill will be here Friday and will make a study of the matter, conferring with the city officials at that time. It is believed that some satisfactory arrangement can be made.
