SNAP SHOTS OF WORLD'S NEWS

Efforts to exclude J. H. Thomas as a vice-president of the Royal Colonial Institute because of his part in the recent general strike in Great Britain have proved unsuccessful.

When Mr. Thomas' name was mentioned at a meeting of the institute, one member objected and moved that it might be deleted.

Lord Stanley, of Alderley, chairman, said that while he believed it was true the recent events were in the nature of an attempted revolution, he doubted whether, in the minds of the ordinary rank and file there was any intention to subvert the political conditions of the country.

Other speakers asked that the motion be withdrawn and this was subsequently done.

The Free State Senate has passed a vote of thanks to Cornelius Sullivan of New York for presenting to the national gallery in trust for the nation, portraits of six distinguished Irishmen—John O'Leary, Fenian Leader George Russell, W. B. Yeats, Standish O'Grady, Douglas Hyde and George Moore. Cornelius O'Sullivan was born in Kerry and is a lawyer practicing in New York City.

PARIS, June 5.—Individually American visitors along the Riviera are "lightweights" in comparison with persons of other nationalities who seek enjoyment and rest in that salubrious region. Is good spender, the Americans are ranked fourth, coming after the Russians, Germans and Egyptians. British visitors are placed fifth. Leading hotel and restaurant proprietors along the Riviera are authorities for this statement.

"Americans and British are no numerous on the Riviera that their total expenditures amount to more than half of all the money left there by foreigners," says a writer who interviewed the purveyors of food and frolic. "But it is a myth that they are the most generous of the visitors. Despite the fact that many of the Russians are in poor circumstances, when they appear in public they are the freest spenders of all foreigners."

During the past year, Germans have occupied many of the most luxurious hotel suites in Nice, Cannes and Monte Carlo and the hotel proprietors consider them excellent guests.

Mountain Pay Toll

News of a mountain tragedy rings through Capetown like a funeral bell. It becomes almost a personal tragedy to everyone. Table Mountain looms into the clouds so close to the city that every detail of its great rock face can be seen from the main street, and that makes the fact of a death on its slopes very close and vivid.

Table Mountain has a dark history. From the earliest days climbers have met disaster, and there is one precipitous part, known as Skeleton gorge, where the bones of a number of long-dead men have been found.

The noted white cloth of clouds which settles over Table Mountain has been responsible for many fatalities. Inexperienced people lose their way and, finding darkness approaching, stumble madly downward toward the city lights. Falls of hundreds of feet await them.

Whenever a person is reported missing parties composed of members of the Mountain club leave their work and set out to search the dangerous ledges and ravines. An appeal for a search party never fails. If the missing person is not found by the weekend, hundreds of people join in the quest.

Table Mountain attracts scores of new climbers on every public holiday, and it is then that the most tragedies occur. Often the body of a lonely climber is not found for several weeks, so vast is the area to be searched.—From the "Daily Mail" Edition of the London Daily Mail.

Audience Only Judge
of Scenes That "Go"

As a rule, it is easy for the author to discover before rehearsal draw to an end where the weaknesses, if any, of his play exist. It is a peculiar thing that a play which reads well often acts badly, and vice versa, writes Cosmo Hamilton in the Saturday Evening Post.

I have noticed many times, with my own work, and with the work of other men, that there are certain scenes which seem to be extraordinarily amusing on paper, but which have only to be put to the test of rehearsal to drop head first into the pit in which, in less expensive days, the orchestra tumbled. It is, too, quite impossible to ascertain, until a play has been well rehearsed, what lines are to be cut, what entrances altered and what exits are to be brought about with greater or less rapidity.

It has been proved again and again how hopeless it is to make a true estimate of a play's appeal to an audience until it faces one. There are few authors and even fewer directors who dare to prophesy exactly how a play will take. Scenes which have been rehearsed for laughs and which have appealed to all concerned as being extremely funny during rehearsal may be received with stony silence by the people in front on "the night."

Other scenes which appear to be trivial and unimportant may go with roars of laughter, while tragic moments, and those in which the whole drama of the play has been worked up to a high pitch may fizzle like damp gunpowder when put to the final test.

People Have Learned
Value of Thermometer

A man named Galileo invented a thermometer in 1592. The liquid was in an open vial, and there was no mark or scale to show temperatures. After a while a mark was used showing the temperature of snow and another for the heat of a candle.

Half a century later a man found he could make a thermometer of a glass tube with a bulb on one end, so that by sealing the other end you could carry the thing about. Another half century or more passed, and Fahrenheit became interested. He developed the thermometer until it was a practical instrument, and by 1714 he had established his now famous Fahrenheit scale.

That was over 200 years ago, says Good Hardware, yet people are just realizing how actually useful this instrument is. For centuries it was looked upon with superstition; a score of years ago school children could tell you the owner of nearly every thermometer in town. The incubator, and then our scientific drying, cooking and gardening, brought the thermometer into common use.

Thermometers are an important item now. They are in demand every day in the year among folks who have learned a little about their uses. Many people demand a specially designed thermometer for each different purpose.

the drug, and suffers hallucinations and is greatly in fear of the man, believing that he exerts an influence over her.

She is still in a very dazed condition and unable to give a coherent statement. Sheriff Stanner questioned her this afternoon but she could give but little information. From what she can remember she says that she ate a meal at Grants Pass just before taking the train for Portland. Morton was not with her at that time, according to her statement. She saw him on the train but remembers nothing more until they were in the hotel in Roseburg. She wanted to get away from him, she said, but he threatened to beat her and she was afraid. She wrote the note so that her husband could come and get her away, she told the sheriff.

She says that she has no recollections of an automobile accident and is unable to account for the big bruise which appears upon the calf of her right leg. Her mind is yet in such a condition that she is unable to give the officers a statement which they can use in helping to clear up the case, as she is still dazed and frightened and unable to think coherently.

Mrs. Johnson is a young woman, evidently between 20 and 25 years of age. She is quite well known about Medford and Grants Pass. It is understood. She is the mother of two small children.

Morton, who is being held under arrest in connection with her case, has not yet been identified. He has apparently not given his true name and an effort is being made to identify him. He is a man about 35 years of age, well dressed, light brown hair, slightly gray, blue eyes, about 5 feet 9 in height and weighing about 185 pounds.

She was also known as "Tommy," and is the mother of two children. She came to this city her former home, from Grants Pass. She attended the Medford high school about 7 years ago, and is well known locally.

After quitting her employment she returned to her mother's home in Grants Pass.

No one by the name of R. C. Morton is known in this city. Mrs. Johnson, according to friends, was acquainted with a man giving the name of Dick Whitworth, who posed as an oil man, and claimed to have a car in a garage at Yreka, Calif.
