PICNIC OPENS
ENTERTAINMENT
FOR VISITOR

A large number of Camp Fire girls from the several groups in Roseburg and Myrtle Creek were gathered Wednesday for the picnic honoring Miss Rowe Wright, of New York City, editor-in-chief of all the publications of the organization, who was the guest of the groups yesterday and today, which was held at the Kwanis Maple Grove during the afternoon. A larger attendance than those present was expected but because the schools at many of the places have not yet been dismissed for the summer many of the groups were unable to be represented.

Miss Wright, following the picnic lunch, addressed the girls informally on camp fire work. She told of the girls' number, the June issue, of the Camp Fire publication, "Every Girl," which was edited by fifteen girls from all over the United States, selected for their high credentials and fine articles submitted to the judges to turn out the publication. Miss Wright also told of the national convention of Camp Fire Girls held in Stockton, from which she is just returning home, giving a few suggestions for the local groups' summer camp, new ideas in handicraft, and camp fire arts. Miss Wright commended the groups on their fine start in camp fire work, and realizing that the local organization is in its pioneer stage, urged the cooperation of the mothers and fathers of Roseburg to push the work forward by giving their help in the primary needs of the organization.

Swimming and games were a part of the pastime enjoyed by the number gathered at the grove during the afternoon.

At 6 o'clock last evening Miss Wright and Theodore A. Harper, of Portland, the member of the Portland council of the Camp Fire Girls who also attended the national convention were guests at dinner at the Hotel Rose, given by the Roseburg Camp Fire Board of Sponsors and Guardians.

A fair sized number was present at the high school auditorium at 8 o'clock to hear Miss Wright and Mr. Harper, who gave talks on camp fire work. Miss Wright spoke of camp fire ideals, and her message to the girls was that of work when applied to a particular work, no matter how difficult the work seemed, was very worth while; she urged the girls to carry their "white middle ideals" of Camp Fire work through life. In speaking of the summer camp, which the girls will hold this year, Miss Wright told them to leave some memory, some definite and better addition to the camp, which would mark their visit there. Miss Wright is a brilliant and charming woman and gave a forceful and inspiring talk from which the groups gathered much valuable information to apply in their work.

Mr. Harper, prominent in the organization's council in Portland, is well known to many readers throughout the state. He is author of "Singing Feathers," and "The Mushroom Boy," well known books written for children. The former book, which was published last year, has been nationally popular.

Mr. Harper talked on making dreams come true, making the point that when one wishes anything very badly he must work hard and can make it come true by applied effort.

Miss Wright and Mr. Harper were guests of the Rotary lunch club at noon today, at which the former was one of the speakers.

OREGON MILITIA
ENTRAINS MONDAY
FOR MEDFORD CAMP

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SALEM, Ore., June 10.—Forty companies of Oregon National Guard infantrymen will entrain Monday night from points throughout the state for Medford where the annual training period will take place at Camp Jackson.

On the same night seven companies of national guard artillerymen will entrain for Fort Stevens. Eight special trains will go to Medford and one to Fort Stevens.

The total number of troops at Camp Jackson will be between 2500 and 2700, and at Fort Stevens about 2500 infantrymen will be in training. Besides the guardsmen at Camp Jackson there will be two companies of regulars from Vancouver Barracks to be used as demonstration troops. Lieutenant General Hunter Liggett, of San Francisco, who was commander of the first American army in France, will be at Camp Jackson for several days. Brigadier General George

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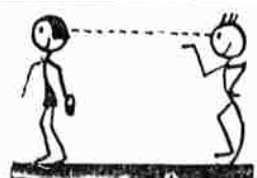
