BODY OF UNKNOWN FOUND FLOATING IN WILLAMETTE

EUGENE, Ore., June 11.—The body of an unidentified man, believed to be about 40 years of age, was found floating in the Willamette river early last evening by two boys who were returning from a fishing trip. The body had been in the water about two weeks. The body was fully clothed, and extra underwear and a hat were found bundled inside the coat. In one hip pocket was a shaving brush, a comb and an empty purse, tied up in a blue bandana handkerchief.

The man was about five feet 9 inches tall, weighed about 160 pounds, had brown hair, blue eyes and wore a sandy mustache. A set of false teeth, the upper plate being for only the back part of the mouth, and one tooth about the middle of the left side on the lower being broken, was also found in his pocket.

TRAIN WRECKED AT TRESTLE; ENGINEER AND FIREMAN SLAIN

NORFOLK, Va., June 11.—The locomotive, mail car, baggage car and two passenger coaches of a

Norfolk Southern passenger train toppled off a trestle fourteen miles west of Washington, N. C., early today, killing the engineer and fireman and injuring a postal employee and a porter.

The Pullman of the train was the only coach to remain on the rails, although one passenger coach just ahead of it was only partially derailed.

Engineer J. R. Slade and Fireman William Harrington, both of Norfolk, are the death victims. The cause of the accident has not been determined and officials are endeavoring to discover whether the bridge was weakened by a fire or whether a blaze there was started by fire from the wrecked locomotive. The structure was about 15 feet high.

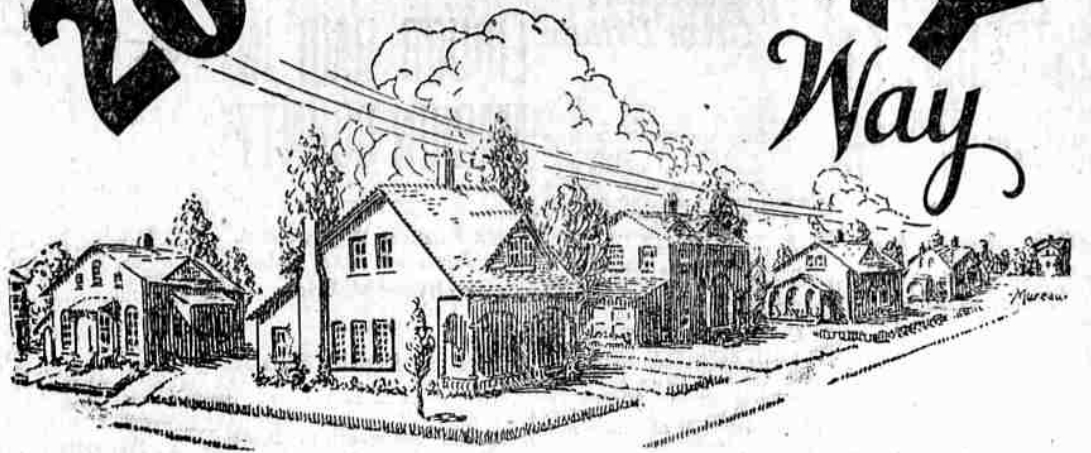
LAST BOY SCOUT COURT OF HONOR TO BE HELD MONDAY

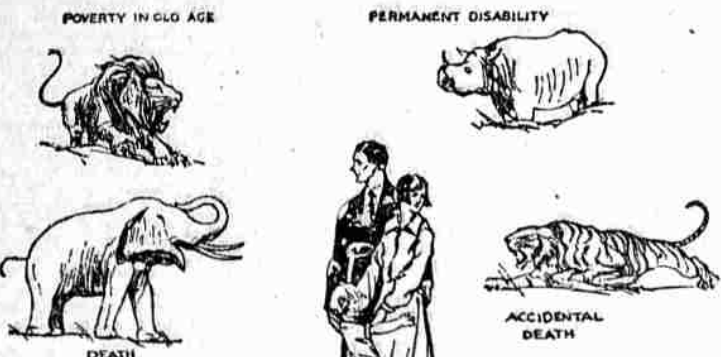
