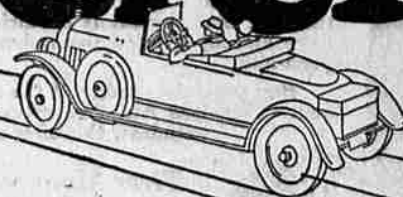

JOHNSON TRIES POLITICAL
COMEBACK IN MINNESOTA

(Associated Press Lined Wire.)
ST. PAUL, Minn., June 11.—Magnus Johnson, who won national attention as Minnesota's "dirt farm" senator, will attempt a political comeback in the June 21 primary election.

Running again on the Farmer-Labor ticket, the former senator is seeking the gubernatorial nomination, contesting with Tom Davis, of Minneapolis. Each has the endorsement of a faction of the party.

In point of national interest, the Republican gubernatorial contest takes second place, with Governor Theodore Christianson opposed by Mayor George E. Leach of Minneapolis. Christianson is serving his first term.

Republicans, Farmer-Laborites and Democrats will nominate candidates in the primary for the national house of representatives, and state, legislative and county posts. There is no United States senatorial contest.

mean that there is trouble with your kidneys, H. For instance, one of the symptoms of diabetes (which is almost always a disease of the pancreas and not a disease of the kidneys) is an excessive amount of urine. Naturally, the kidneys may become inflamed later.

There are also local inflammations of the bladder which sometimes cause a frequent desire to pass water. So the thing for you to do is to go to a physician in your town. If you do not know any of them, ring up your county medical society and ask for a list.
