their politics to join us on the one hand in protecting our schools from those who would use them as stepping stones to political preferment, and on the other from those who would sacrifice this heritage to the timber barons for selfish purposes."

Farm Aid Favored. Another plank demands "a square deal for the farmers of the nation." Declaring that the farmers are "the backbone of our country's strength and greatness," it asserts:

"Their needs and petitions have been ignored by the Republican party while government support has been lavishly given to the favored interests by protective tariff, special privileges and paternalistic legislation." It would pledge the democratic party to "constructive relief for the farmers."

Repeal of the two-thirds majority rule in Democratic national conventions is advocated in a resolution reported by the committee. The national committee from this state, should be instructed to vote to eliminate the rule.

the speaker's committee at Philadelphia's Ritz hotel headquarters, was preceded by the stand by another Pinchot worker, T. Henry Walnut, in charge of Philadelphia headquarters, who put into the record a statement showing receipts of \$28,397, with expenditures of \$24,171 by the committee in Philadelphia.

Some of the more important expenditures listed were \$7,200 for watchers; \$2,680 for "salaries"; \$3,152 for printing, and \$1,000 for meetings.

"Watch" System Told. Colonel Robert Clendenning of Philadelphia, also testified how he had organized a committee to support Senator Pepper, and had put on it every one he thought was good for a \$1,000 contribution.

Beutel told the committee he knew of no case where an offer outright of \$10 was made for a vote, "but instead they hire you as a watcher."

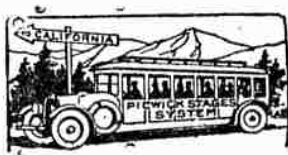
He then described for the committee the "Pittsburgh checker," a very low type of individual, who is paid to work off "watch" for one candidate and then vote for another.

Receivership Of Central Railroad Comes To An End.—The receivership of the Central Railroad of Oregon, which connects Union and Cove with the Union Pacific main line at Union Junction, has been dissolved and W. B. Davis, of Union, has been discharged as receiver, the result of a decision late yesterday made public today by Circuit Judge J. W. Knowles. Charles Moore automatically resumes management of the road.

Judge Knowles declares that a receivership for the road is not necessary at present. His decision follows arguments which were heard about a week ago.

Davis was appointed to the receivership a few weeks ago upon the complaint of A. W. Middleton, president of the Blue Mountain Lumber company, which controls the strike of the railroad, that certain creditors had obtained judgment against the railroad and has advertised the property for sale to satisfy the judgments and that an injunction was necessary to prevent the sale and a receiver to take charge of the property and arrange for payment of the debts.

Union and Cove people are hopeful that the railroad service will be resumed in time to ship out the cherry crop, which will ripen the last of this month.

Present Membership Gives Post Third Place in State With Right to Six Delegates.

DEFENSE MAKING FIGHT AT INQUEST INTO FATAL RAID

SALEM, Ore., June 12.—Robin Day, attorney for Joe and Bill Brown, who are among the defendants in the moonshine case out of which the gun fight on the Brown farm near Broadacres Thursday night, appeared suddenly today at the coroner's inquest into the death of John Kaboris and requested that a verdict of the jury be withheld until he could produce witnesses. He asked that he be given until Monday.

After examining nine witnesses this forenoon, the inquest adjourned until Monday, and Day is to be informed that he is to have his witnesses ready by that time. District Attorney Carson has three more witnesses to call.

The most important testimony offered today was testimony by friends of Kaboris and the Brown brothers that from 20 to 24 shots were fired in the gun fight, and that these took place after both of the Angelis boys had gotten guns from their house.

Front street commission men were unable to clean up their country veal receipts this week and a considerable amount of calves will be carried over in the coolers. Closing prices were weak at an extreme top of 15 cents. Bulk of offerings 12 to 14 cents. Country hogs held firm to the close at 20 to 21 cents.

Butter closed steady and unchanged. Receipts liberal during the week but there was a good outlet to the south. Cooler stocks are increasing rapidly with a total of 474,725 pounds reported in local storage.

PORTLAND, June 12.—Activity is picking up in the local wool market with values fully maintained to a shade higher. Over a half million pounds have been taken by buyers in eastern Oregon at prices ranging from 28 to 31 cents. Buyers are now entering their activities around Shaniko, Condon, Pilot Rock and Heppner, one of the largest clips to sell recently was the Wheeler county pool of 100,000 pounds, purchased by Alex Livingston at a price better than 30 cents. Charles H. Green purchased the Hilton clip of 60,000 pounds at Condon, at a price of 31 cents. E. J. Burke also took several small lots of wool around Pilot Rock this week.
