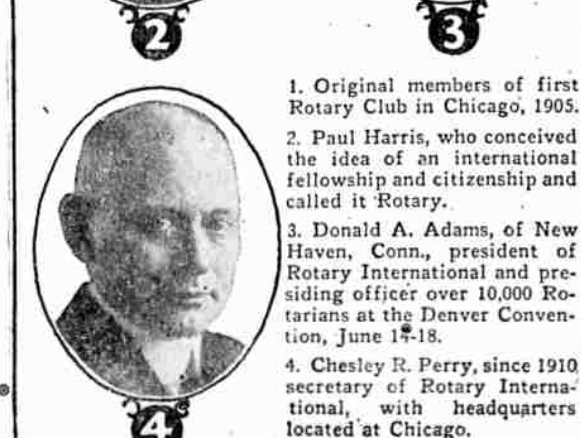
Following a honeymoon trip to Crater Lake and other points in the south they will make their home in Roseburg.

FLASHES OF LIFE

BUCHAREST — Bootleggers in silk stockings are reaping fortunes in Rumania. There is a prohibitive duty on silks, lingerie, perfumes and articles of luxury generally. The Rumanian woman, who is the best dressed in the Balkans, demands these articles at any cost. The result is that bootleggers, many of them women, bring in clandestinely thousands of pairs of Parisian silk hosiery and sell them to the retail stores or direct to users. Their profits are enormous.

WASHINGTON—It looks like this falling plaster business is due for a congressional investigation. More of it fell Sunday while President Coolidge was attending church services in a theater. The First Congregational church, where he usually worships, had been closed for plaster repairs and the President next year will have to vacate the executive mansion while the weakened roof is strengthened.

NEW YORK—Nicolo Covello, 79, an English musician, who had played before several of Britain's crowned heads, visited Coney Island yesterday, became angered at blatant jazz played on musical devices and dropped dead. "Stop that music!" were his last words.

CONWAY, North Wales—Mrs. Jane Jones, owner of the smallest home in Great Britain, is dead. This tiny habitation, Conway Quay, has a frontage of six feet. It is ten feet, two inches high and from back to front measures about eight feet, four inches. Twenty-five years ago the house was tenanted by a man six feet three inches in height.

DUBLIN—Ireland is going to insist on having the real "bouquet" in her whiskey after the present year. Next year it will be illegal to sell in the Free State any whiskey which has not matured for five years. Since 1915 whiskey only three years old might be sold, but the government has adopted the five-year restriction to increase the prestige of the Irish pot still brand, and also to check the competition in the country of Scotch whiskey, which for some time has been displacing the home product.
