MEETING FRUIT MEN IS CALLED FOR JUNE 22

Important Matters to Be
Considered According
to County Agent.

PROF. LONG COMING

Spray Residue Apt to Seriously
Damage Market
Unless Growers Take
Immediate Action.

Pear and apple growers of Douglas county do not adequately appreciate the serious responsibilities they face in marketing their pear and apple crops this year owing to the arsenical residue on the fruit. The county agent feels that growers should have the facts fully placed before them. With this in mind a general meeting of growers has been called at the city hall for Tuesday, June 22, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

"We realize this to be our most busy season and do not make it a practice to call any type of meeting at this season of the year unless we have information that we believe has a direct bearing upon our producers' success financially," County Agent Cooney says. "Every grower should by this time realize that a stay-at-home policy often leads to disaster when he comes to marketing his crops. Growers must realize that they should keep up with vital happenings insofar as they have bearing upon the crops they produce. A few brief words will indicate the information coming and the need for action."

"Early in October, 1925, American Jonathans were seized by British health authorities on account of carrying more than one one-hundredth grain of arsenic to a pound of fruit; the same fruit was held responsible for causing sickness among British consumers. Then followed many prosecutions of British fruit retailers for handling excessively contaminated fruit; fines were levied; retailers became positively afraid of handling American Jonathans; Importers had supplies seized at the ports; and the trade in red apples resembling the Jonathan was placed in a very chaotic state even before the Christmas season."

"By the first week in January, widespread publicity went abroad in Great Britain that Newtowns from Oregon were also found to carry heavy arsenical spray residues and this straightway had a disastrous effect upon the sales of this popular variety throughout the United Kingdom. Prior to this time, the Newtown had enjoyed a clean bill of health but a contingent from the Medford district, carrying excessive amounts of arsenic, ruined its immunity for the balance of the winter."

"Between January 1 and April 1 over 1000 newspaper articles, editorials and cartoons appeared in the British press on this subject. The prosecution of retailers continued all winter. Trade was stagnated. Prices slumped and retailers at a low price all winter. The losses to growers, shippers and importers can only be guessed at, though certain it is that they were very great."

Trouble Spreads to U. S.
"Many apples that might have been exported were placed on the American markets on account of the disastrous condition of European markets. This had a depressing effect on American markets. "The prevalence of heavy spray residues extended to our own markets and as many as 42 cars of apples were withheld from sale at one point by the bureau of chemistry. This fruit had to be unpacked, wiped and brushed and repacked before it could be offered for sale. The expense of this was heartbreaking. Only last week another twelve carloads were similarly held up in New York. Through the courtesy of the government officials condemnation and destruction measures have not been instituted in the United States this year and this has saved the industry from having the American press take up this subject and bringing about such devastating results as can only be too well imagined."

"From what has already taken place we can assume that pear and apple growers will this year have their fruit subjected to the most stringent of regulations and inspections. "The object of this meeting will be a study of what best to do in our control of moth and meet the demands of the inspectors," concluded Mr. Cooney.

Prof. Clayton L. Long, horticultural specialist from the extension department of the agricultural college, will be present at this meeting and lend his assistance to the growers in every possible way.

HIGH SCHOOL GIRL SWEEPED TO DEATH IN 275-FOOT CATARACT

SEATTLE, June 14.—Alberta Legge, 15, a Seattle high school girl, was swept to her death over the 275 foot Sunset falls near Index, Wash., yesterday.

Leaping from rock to rock at the top of the falls while her parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. T. Legge, and two brothers, were sitting

nearby, the girl slipped and was hurled over the cataract, which falls 600 feet in all. The water-fall has claimed the lives of 29 men who attempted to leap it in boats.

M'PHERSON HUNT TRANSFERRED TO MASSACHUSETTS

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 14.—Police today began a search for a woman said to resemble Almee Temple McPherson, missing Los Angeles evangelist, who registered at a lodging house here Saturday night. She left yesterday after informing the housekeeper that she had found a brother and would go visit him. The proprietor of the lodging house told police that the woman, who gave her name as Nazon, resembled published photographs of Mrs. McPherson and admitted that she was an evangelist. She said she had been at McPherson's Los Angeles temple on May 18 when the announcement was made that the evangelist had been drowned.

Miss Devers is a graduate from the St. Francis hospital at La Crosse, Wisconsin, and Miss Lefert is from Wichita, Kansas. All are nurses who have had considerable experience giving a very able staff at the local hospital.

DEPORTATION TO MADAGASCAR LIKELY TO BE KRIM'S FATE

PARIS, June 14.—Franco-Spanish conferences on the future status of the Rif zone in Morocco and the disposition to be made of the Rifian chief, Abd-el-Krim, began today.

The Petit Parisien says Abd-el-Krim and his wives and children, and doubtless his uncle and his brother-in-law, Mohammed Azor-kane—forty persons in all—will be deported to Madagascar, off the coast of South Africa, if the Franco-Spanish conference on the Moroccan situation approve.

The other Rifian prisoners—250 in all—will be distributed in various parts of French territory.

FRENCH FRANC IS AT LOWER NOTCH

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PARIS, June 14.—The French franc today tumbled to a new low record for all time, reaching 36.57 to the dollar and 173.25 to the pound sterling.

At the close of the bourse the franc had receded a little and was quoted at 35.49 to the dollar. The opinion is growing more and more that the franc can never be stabilized under the entire situation, political as well as financial, is threshed out.

SENTENCES THAT RUN CONCURRENTLY DON'T BAR PAROLE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SALEM, Ore., June 14.—A prisoner sentenced to the state penitentiary by one judgment order that imposes upon him more than one sentence, running concurrently, provided he has not been previously convicted, is not deprived of the benefits of the parole law. This is the opinion of Attorney General VanWinkle in reply to an inquiry by Governor Pierce. The case cited by the governor was that of a man sentenced to serve three sentences of three, three and two years. The parole law does not apply to the sentence of a prisoner who has been previously convicted. The three sentences in the case of the man cited by the governor are held to be tantamount to one three-year sentence. Three requisitions were issued today by Governor Pierce, one on the governor of Utah and one on the governor of California. The Utah requisition asks that extradition of Carl and Jack Forthley, wanted in Tillamook county for forgery and receiving stolen property respectively. The third requisition was on the governor of New York asking the extradition of Murtis Lehto, wanted in Clatsop county for larceny.

W. T. PERKINS DIES
