ing which I am convinced by force of indisputable evidence would not have been only in conflict with the award of the arbitrator, but contrary to the agreement for a plebiscite not violative of the rights of one of the nations concerned. Arbitration was never intended as a cloak for such a wrong."

SANTIAGO, Chile, June 15.—Upon receipt of news from Africa of the adoption of General Lassiter's motion, the Chilean government is understood to have sent instructions to its ambassador at Washington to break off the negotiations, for a direct settlement which have been going on under the good offices of the United States.

Hope About Gone
WASHINGTON, June 15.—Failure apparently is about to bring to a swift termination the efforts of Washington to settle the old Chilean-Peruvian controversy over the little Pacific seaboard province of Tacna and Arica.

A slight hope of avoiding completed collapse of the negotiations still was in the minds of officials here today, and President Coolidge continued ready to take whatever steps he might find practicable, either now or in the future, to bring the two South American nations into accord. But the swift developments of the past 24 hours generally were regarded to have dealt a severe blow to the prospect of a settlement.

All Bermuda Islands of Coral Formation

To many persons Bermuda's hundred odd islands are a dot on the map. In reality, Bermuda lies about 700 miles southeast of New York and about 600 miles directly east of Charleston, S. C. The extreme length of the archipelago is about 28 miles, varying in width from three-quarters of a mile to three miles. The principal islands are five in number—the mainland, St. George's, St. David's, Somerset and Ireland.

Just when Bermuda was created we do not know. Upon the top of a hidden sea mountain—said to be 15,000 feet high—millions upon millions of tiny sea creatures erected a mass of coral through long aeons past.

Up through the waves they built this group of large and small islets, lying close together—so close in some cases that man has built causeways to connect them—and on up until the coral formation rises several hundred feet above sea level.

Just who put Bermuda on the map is not known. An old Spanish map of 1510 shows them and a Spanish historian gives an account of them in a chronicle of the voyages of Juan de Bermudez in 1515. It seems likely that Bermudez had some previous knowledge of their existence and named them for himself.—Journeys Beautiful.

Some Trouble to Get Light in Early Times

It was not until 1834 that tuiet matches superseded the flint and steel. Every house in Britain prior to this time had its tinder box filled with charred flint, moss, and other materials. These were kept along with the flint and steel on the mantel above the fireplace. With the tinder box were long, thin, flat matches tipped at both ends with sulphur. Flints were matches ages before the tinder match was invented, but they would not fire by friction.

When a light was needed the matches, flint and steel were taken from the box and the tinder left in. The steel, shaped like a horseshoe magnet, was struck against the flint, and the sparks produced were allowed to fall upon the tinder. Sooner or later it began to smolder. The brimstone tip of the match was applied, burst into flame and set fire to the wood of the match.

American Common Schools
The common schools of America had their beginning in Massachusetts in 1635. The Boston town meeting in that year asked Philline Parment to become schoolmaster and voted him 30 acres of land in part payment for his services. The school he organized later became the Boston Latin school, which has had a continuous existence to the present day. The example set by Boston was followed by other colonial settlements in the following ten years. In 1647 the general court of Massachusetts ordered every town having 50 families to appoint a teacher. At the same time townships having 100 families were required to establish a grammar school to prepare youths for college. The law establishing these two grades of schools laid the foundation of the public school system of the United States.—Ex-

Needs Human Skill

All the best china is still made on the potter's wheel and requires the skill of the human hand to give it the desired shape. After the potter places the lump of kneaded clay on his rapidly spinning wheel, he shapes it into a cup, saucer or plate with his fingers. Handles and other attachments are made separately and placed on the dish forms while the clay is still soft. From the potter's wheel the finished dishes go to the gas furnace for the first rough firing. They must have even heat and must not be placed so they will adhere to each other. The firing process lasts about three days. Three more days are required for the dishes to cool. This cooling off must take place slowly or the dishes crack.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 15.—Top grades of eggs are a cent higher in the local market today with fresh standard extras again posted at 31c on the dairy exchange. Other grades remain steady at unchanged prices.

Storage holdings in local coolers are gradually increasing but taking the country as a whole they are not yet up to last year's figures at this time or the five-year average on June 1.

Butter quotations remain steady and unchanged on the local board although the market has a weak undertone. Cubes are plentiful, according to jobbers, and inclined to accumulate in spite of the heavy movement to the south.
