HOP GROWERS OF OREGON FACE BIG LOSS THIS YEAR

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SALEM, Ore., June 17.—Local hopmen, who have examined yards all over the valley, agree that the fuggle crop for 1926 threatens to be a failure due, probably, to premature blooming caused by exceptionally fine weather in the early spring. A conservative estimate now places the loss at 50 per cent of last year's crop, when the crop in the valley also was short for the same reason. A normal fuggle crop runs from 10,000 to 12,000 bales, hopmen say, with a rough estimated value of half a million dollars, at a price of 25 cents a pound. The 1925 crop is now sold down to 577 bales, as a result of recent purchases of 881 bales made by T. A. Livesley and Clifford Brown, local operators, at prices running from 29 to 30 1/2 cents a pound, the best prices paid for that crop.

In addition Livesley has just purchased 40,000 pounds of the Sloper Brothers 1926 crop at Independence for 25 cents a pound, the top price yet paid for the new crop. Unless something unusual happens, predictions are made by Salem dealers that the 1926 crop of clusters will be even larger than the enormous 1925 crop.

A cable received here from Barth, largest continental operator at Nuremberg, Germany, reports that the crop in Belgium and Bohemia is in a serious condition, attributed to some unknown blight which the growers are unable to combat. So far weather conditions there, the cable said, are very unsatisfactory. Stocks held by brewers and dealers are light.

Elizabeth Dupont and Mr. Morgan were childhood playmates in Fairville and their engagement occasioned no surprise to friends of the couple. The young couple have been together constantly. Miss Dupont is 20 years old and Mr. Morgan is 21.

BOBBY JONES AND WATTS GUNN LEAD IN GOLF TOURNEY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SUNNINGDALE, Eng., June 17.—Bobby Jones, American amateur golf champion, followed up his record breaking 66 of yesterday by shooting 68 in the second round of the qualification play for the British open championship tournament today, giving him a low aggregate of 134.

Jones leads the field of 142 who are striving for the 49 places allotted to this, the southern section of the qualification play. Forty-two places are being decided among the 123 players in the central section of St. Anne's. No Americans were entered in the northern section at Western Gallies, Scotland, where the ten best scores and ties for tenth qualify.

Watts Gunn, Atlanta amateur, and Walter Hagen, American pro, led the field at St. Anne's at the end of yesterday's play with 72 each.

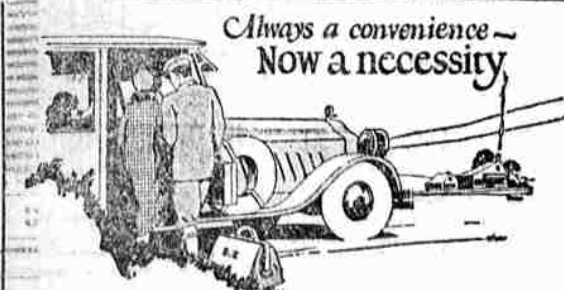

Chinese Republic Has Experienced 15 Forms of Government Since 1912

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) PEKING, June 17.—The so-called Chinese republic has experienced 15 distinct phases of government in its hectic career of 14 years ending with the present period, where no semblance of government exists.

Ten individuals have functioned as heads of state or chiefs of governing cabinet during that time. Suno Yat-sen, revolutionist agitator, returning from activities abroad after the revolution of 1911, was chosen provisional president by the Council of Nanking. He stepped aside in favor of Yuan Shih-kai upon abdication of the Manchu emperor.

One Ruled, Until Death Yuan Shih-kai, who had acted as mediator between the republicans and monarchists in revolutionary days, yielded to personal ambition after two years of arbitrary rule as president, and launched his monarchical project. Discontent and open rebellion impelled him to abandon the effort and he resumed the title of president. At death in 1916, he was succeeded by the then vice-president, Li Yuan-hung, who held office from June 6, 1916, to July 7, 1917.

President Li Yuan-hung's term was interrupted by the short-lived restoration of the young emperor, Hsuan-tung, who was proclaimed by General Chang Hsun after the latter had led an army from Shantung. Chang Hsun's fellow militarists gave him no support, however, and he was attacked and defeated by Tuan Chih-jui, dismissed premier under President Li Yuan-hung. Chih-jui was recalled to the premiership after Li Yuan-hung had refused to resume office, and carried on the government until the assumption of the presidency by Feng Kuo-chang, on September 18, 1917.

Tientsin Is Safety Zone Feng Kuo-chang was succeeded by Hsu Shih-ch'ang, who was elected by parliament on September 4, 1918. Hsu had been vice premier in Prince Chang's cabinet under the monarchy, vice-president of the Privy Council and chief of the general staff.

Hsu lasted less than a year and was forced out by General Wu Pei-fu, who, freshly victorious over Chang Tso-liu, dictator of Man-

churia, demanded Hsu's retirement. Li Yuan-hung came out of hiding in Tientsin to resume the presidency.

Li's second administration lasted a year, ending with a second dash for Tientsin and safety. Now Has No Government Tsao Kun, "Inspector General" of Chihli, Honan and Shantung provinces and the bigwig of the Chihli party, succeeded Li Yuan-hung. He was elected by parliament October 10, 1925, a sufficient number of whose members had been "bought." Tsao was supported by Wu Pei-fu, dictator of military affairs in North China within the walls, but the latter's ambitious campaign against Chang Tso-liu, warlord of Manchuria, let to Tsao Kun's downfall. Feng Yuhaiang defected in the midst of Wu's drive and himself took possession of the capital. Tsao was imprisoned.

Tuan Chih-jui came out of retirement as a compromise incumbent on November 24, 1925, and lasted until the collapse of the Kuankun, known as the People's Army party organized by Feng. On April 9, 1926, he likewise sought safety in Tientsin. The cabinet also having fled, the country was left without a government.

20 MILLION DOLLAR FACTORY ERECTION STARTED BY DELCO

DAYTON, Ohio, June 17.—Immediate construction of a \$20,000,000 factory addition, one mile long at Moraine City, near here by the Delco Light company, was announced today. It is the first step in a contemplated \$1,000,000,000 expansion program which company officials say is due to newspaper advertising.

The new factory will be used entirely in the construction of electric refrigerators.

MEDFORD, Ore., June 17.—A brush and grass fire, that raged on the north slope of Roxy Anne, a peak overlooking this city, all yesterday was extinguished last night by a force of firefighters under Deputy State Forester W. B. Lowry. The fire threatened a number of orchards for a time. Tuesday night a "fiery cross" was burned upon the hillside, and the fire was attributed to the display. The deputy state forester reports that the fire was maliciously set, to cast suspicion upon the "fiery cross."
