### LENS OF AIR CAMERA WILL SPAN 218 MILES

(Associated Press Local Wire.)  
**DAYTON, O., June 18.**—Some time this month Lieutenant George W. Goddard, McCook field army aviator, expects to scale the high reaches of the earth's atmosphere over Dayton and take a photograph of Detroit, Mich., 218 miles away. He will pilot the plane and also operate the camera.

When he hops off he will be equipped with many of the best instruments of aviation and photography. He expects to fly to an altitude of 32,000 feet. The ship itself must be an especially constructed one in order to withstand the strain of the high altitude, so he has been allotted the plane used frequently by Lt. John A. Macready.

**Camera 500 Where Eye Can't**  
The camera he will carry can penetrate distant haze and record on a 23-inch by 9-inch film, objects which the eye of the photographer could not detect. While McCook field officials do not hope to obtain a photograph of Detroit which will show close details, they are expecting a photograph which will show some definite outlines of the city's location and terrain. They expect to be able to see the approaches to the city, the portion of the St. Lawrence river system which connect Lake Erie, Lake St. Clair, and other distinguishing features.

**New Military Asset**  
The value of the altitude-photographic test will be of military as well as scientific importance. An added military asset, it is pointed out that no longer would it be necessary for aviators to fly over enemy territory in order to photograph important positions in time of war. They could ascend a few miles over their own lines, protected by their own land and air forces and photograph distant points with accuracy, even penetrating the smoke of battle.

**Has Pictured 120 Mile Area**  
Lieutenant Goddard frequently takes altitude pictures of comparatively close range. From a height of 7,000 feet, he has photographed a mile and one-quarter section of territory with such fine coordination of camera and aviation knowledge that on the resulting print, one could distinguish such minute objects as cornstalks and furrows in fields, telephone wires and branches of trees.

Several months ago, from a height of 19,000 feet over Camp Perry, he photographed an area covering 120 miles. The print showed all shores of Lake Erie, the city of Cleveland, the islands of the lake and some Canadian ports.
