G. F. ALLISON, WELL KNOWN HERE, KILLED NEAR HILLSBORO

PORTLAND, June 18.—G. F. Allison, conductor on the Oregon Electric railroad, was killed near Hillsboro yesterday afternoon, when a car of the train ran over him. It was said that while cars of a trainload of logs were being switched, one of the cars broke loose from the train and struck Mr. Allison.

Mr. Allison was a resident of Portland, his home being at 1176 Ivy street. He had been in railroad service for more than 30 years. Before going to the Oregon Electric he was for several years in the service of the Southern Pacific company. Besides his widow he is survived by four daughters, Mrs. Frances Corrigan, Mrs. Margaret Donaldson and Miss Nell Allison of Portland, and Mrs. Hazel Hicks of San Francisco. Mrs. Hicks moved from Portland to San Francisco three weeks ago.

EPIDEMIC OF SMALLPOX IS FEARED IN CITY

An epidemic of smallpox is to be avoided in Roseburg only by careful check on all suspected cases and by vaccination, according to Dr. Thompson, county health officer. The health unit has discovered two cases of smallpox in the city, both having been previously unreported. One, it was learned, was diagnosed as measles, and the patient was released before the time for smallpox quarantined, and has attended social functions where a number of people have doubtless been exposed. One case of smallpox exists in Oakland and there is a small epidemic in Cottage Grove at the present time. Vaccination is recommended in every case where persons have not been previously vaccinated. In the event of sickness it is advised that a physician be called at once and any case of smallpox promptly reported in order that an epidemic may be prevented.

OREGON NEWSPAPERMEN CONVENE AT PRINEVILLE

PRINEVILLE, Ore., June 18.—The nineteenth annual convention of the Oregon State Editorial association opened here today. The business session was presided over by A. Lea Mallory, president and editor of the Tillamook Headlight. A report of the legislative committee on the proposed legislative program for 1927 was read and group luncheons were held at noon. At the afternoon session T. Raymond Conway, prominent Mazama, gave a talk on "Oregon's scenic asset and how the state's newspapers may aid in the development of it." Hal E. Hoos, president of the Pacific Slope newspaper conference, also spoke. In the evening session, E. O. Blanchard, president of the First National Bank of Hood River, will be the principal speaker. His topic will be "How the newspapers and banks of the small town may work together for the community good."

E. E. Brodie, publisher of the Oregon City Enterprise, will read a report on the National Editorial associations activities on government envelope legislation. A buckaroo breakfast at the G. H. Russell ranch Saturday and many other entertainment features await the pleasure of the visiting delegates.

OREGON WOOL GROWERS GET SATISFACTORY PRICE

PORTLAND, Ore., June 18.—A big improvement is seen in the wool market, not only in the east, but at sealed bid sales held recently in the Condon and Shaliko districts. Clips were well taken at both sales and prices satisfactory to the grower were obtained. At the Condon sale 313 cents was paid for one clip, the highest price so far this season in Oregon. There were 15 separate lots, totalling approximately 144,300 pounds disposed of. Prices ranged from 292 cents to 314 cents.

CONGRESS WILL VOTE TO ADJOURN JUNE 30

WASHINGTON, June 18.—The Republican house steering committee agreed today to ask for sine die adjournment of congress on Wednesday, June 30. A resolution proposing adjournment on this date will be called up in the house Monday and is expected to receive the approval of the leaders of both senate and house. The committee decided that to seek adjournment on Saturday, June 26, as at first contemplated, would unduly hasten consideration of the deficiency appropriation bill which includes provision for the new federal buildings throughout the country to be started this year.
