MOVIE NOTES

Liberty Theatre.

Good Western drama, decorated with several highly novel and effective features, is the basis of "Wild To Go," P. B. O.'s newest release with Tom Tyler, which will be shown here at the Liberty Theatre beginning Friday. 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BEAUTY CHATS

PLAIN SOAP AND WATER

People who write about beauty and beauty treatment are apt to talk almost entirely about cold cream and such lotions, and neglect to mention the greatest skin beautifier of all, which is plain soap and water. There is a right way and a wrong to wash the face, and there are soaps that are good and soaps that are bad for the skin. Let us find out more about plain soap and water. First of all no soap should take oil from the skin. The best toilet soap, therefore, is one containing an abundance of pure vegetable oil, olive oil is the best, and palm oil and coconut oil are practically as good. Most good soaps advertise what they are made of. If you pay a fair price you will be certain to get a good soap. You do not have to pay exorbitant amounts for fancy boxes, you want the quality in the soap and not the wrapper. Buy a good oily soap, get it without perfume if possible, and don't pay less than ten cents a cake. If you live in a hard water district, use any brands of hard water soap which soften the water for you, otherwise use a bit of borax in the water or, better yet, powdered oatmeal. Open the pores of the skin by wringing your face cloth from the hot water and holding it a moment over the face. Rub the soap in well and then rinse. Rinse with water as hot as what you have washed with, and if possible even hotter. It is necessary to get every bit of the soap from the skin which can only be done by relaxing the pores still further, so they can throw off not only the soap but everything the soap has absorbed in the skin. End by a cold rinse to close the pores. If your soap is good quality and you have rinsed it out thoroughly your face will not be shiny. If it feels dry after such a treatment, the next time you wash the face rub it with cold cream and use this vigorous soap and water wash to take the cream from the skin.

Miss A. F. B. — From your description of the cream I should think that you had put too much borax in it. There is no reason why you should not use the cream as a cleanser, especially for ridding your skin of the blackheads. Be sure to rinse enough to get all of the cream from your skin or the borax will make it feel parched.

Hot, damp rags held over the places where the blackheads collect will open the pores and soften the skin, so the cream has a better chance to dissolve the impurities in the enlarged pores. Always close the pores again after any kind of cleansing of this kind, either with very cold water or an ice rub.

Mrs. W. S. K. — Sage and sulphur mixtures will not color grey hair beyond a light shade of tan, and since your hair is dark brown you will not gain anything by using this method.

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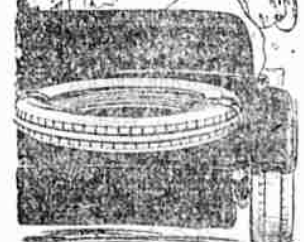
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
