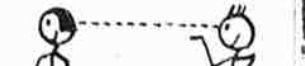

Sylvia Howard Gaines.

Couple Saw Crime

SEATTLE, June 18.—A young
couple from the University of
Washington saw Sylvia Howard
Gaines beaten to death on the
margin of Green Lake in this city
Wednesday night, Captain Jusus
of the Seattle police announced to-
day.

"We were returning home from
the library Wednesday evening,"
one of the couple related, "and
took a short cut along a path that
skirts the lake. I noticed what I
thought was a boy of slender build
cross the path a short distance in
front of us.

"He was walking hurriedly and
seemed slightly stooped, as if he
was carrying something heavy.

"He crossed to the lake shore.
We heard a moaning sound. My
companion called: 'Hey, kid, what's
the matter there?'

"The fellow answered, 'Oh, just
a drunken guy' and then he cried—
'shut up, or the cops will get you.'"

"The moaning sound was like a
gurgle. We saw the fellow raise
a rock. I thought then he threw
it into the lake, for there was a
sort of splashing sound.

"This was repeated several
times, I guess, as we walked on
thinking it was only a couple of
boys who were drunk. The growl-
ing continued and my companion
remarked that the fellow must be
pretty sick, from the sound.

"It didn't occur to us that there
was any girl there. The fellow
talked casually and we had no sus-
picion."

"They declared a small auto was
parked near by the lake where
Miss Gaines met her death.

"Police learned that at 5 o'clock
Wednesday afternoon Miss Gaines
was found lying on the ground, an
abstract company was heard rais-
ing an encumbrance in the city hall
to meet some one at the Green
Lake library at nine that night.
The library is a mile from the fatal
grove.

RECORDS FOR NUMBER

MARRIAGE LICENSES

Wedding licenses for the month
of June reached the high mark
today when County Clerk L. H.
Riddle issued the 21st license for
the month. With twelve days yet
to go it appears that all records
will be far surpassed. Heretofore
31 licenses in June has been the
record, but this year the number
for the first part of the month
has averaged nearly two per day
instead of one daily. One reason
for the increased number is the
fact that former restriction allow-
ing the clerk to issue licenses only
where the prospective bride was
a resident of the county, has been
removed. It is now possible to
issue licenses to any couple hav-
ing a witness to make affidavit
as to their ages. This has result-
ed in many licenses being granted
to couples from California.
