LOCKJAW AFTER MOTOR ACCIDENT FATAL TO YOUTH

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 19.—Harold Smith, aged 29, employee of the Forest Lumber company at Chiloquin, died this morning of tetanus, commonly known as lockjaw.

Smith was injured in a motor accident June fifth, and sustained a broken ankle and cuts and bruises. The fatal infection found its source in the injuries incurred in the crash. Liberal use of an antitetanus serum proved of no avail.

It is the first case of lockjaw which has occurred in Klamath county in 12 years.

WIDOW OF SLAIN KING OF GREECE PASSES, AGED 75

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

ROME, June 19.—The former Dowager Queen Olga of Greece, grandmother of the late King Alexander and widow of King George I, is dead, aged 75, at her home, the villa Anastasia.

Olga was widowed when King George I was assassinated at Salonika in March, 1913. She was born a grand duchess of Russia and was married to George at St. Petersburg, now Leningrad, October 15, 1867. Subsequent to the death of King Alexander, her grandson, in 1920, from the effects of a monkey bite, she assumed the regency, which she held until the return of Greece to the late King Constantine. Constantine abdicated in 1922 and the Republic of Greece was formed in March, 1924.
