Helliwell-Rice Nuptials on Wednesday Evening Beautiful Church Affair

With the simplicity and dignity of a beautiful church setting and characterized with the charm of perfect appointments, the wedding of Miss Iris Rice, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dexter Rice, and Donald Helliwell, son of Ernest Helliwell, was solemnized Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock at St. George's Episcopal church in the presence of more than 150 assembled guests, of which many numbered from various points in the state.

The bride and her attendants formed a beautiful picture as they advanced through the aisle to an elaborate high altar, flanked on either side by gladioli and delphinium combined with asparagus fern, with a background of evergreen bush honeysuckle, where the impressive Episcopal service was read by Rev. Ernest Potter, Rector. Tall candelabra burning at the chancel gave a soft glow to the scene, furnishing the only light.

Preceded by the four ushers and four bridesmaids, the bride, on the arm of her father, was unusually attractive in a sleeveless bridal gown designed from white satin and tulle, with basque fitting bodice, and full tulle skirt, embroidered in silver, over white satin and silver lace. Narrow bands of tulle were caught at the shoulders with small rosettes. Wearing a full length tulle veil formed with a cap of rare lace, and orange blossoms caught at the sides, the bride was an entrancing vision at the altar. Taffeta Is Worn Throughout the Day

From the Simple Models for Afternoon to the Elaborate Robe de Style That Graces the Dance, Taffetas, Plain and Embroidered, Lead the Mode



The robe de style, which is holding its own in a season of conflicting silhouettes is perhaps the chief reason for the great popularity of taffeta in the spring mode.

Taffetas, soft and shimmering, appear to advantage in the very bouffant evening gowns which possess so much distinction. Shades which are either pale and delicate in tone, or rich and colorful in their appeal, are used with equal success. The always popular evening gown of all white is remarkably effective in taffeta when combined with silver. All black, too, a favorite with the smartly dressed, is distinctive and stunning in taffeta with a bouffant silhouette.

Mousseline, which is another favorite of the moment, appears to advantage when combined with the taffeta in either matching or contrasting shade. Velvet ribbons, tinsel ribbons, floral bouquets and lace are all used with colorful results on the important robe de style.

Alleen Pringle, who wears her clothes so smartly in the new Robert Kane production, "The Wilderness Woman," for First National Pictures, has selected for the important scenes an extremely new and interesting gown in black taffeta which makes use of the always effective combination of black and white.

The gown, a distinguished example of the robe de style, possesses features which were popular in revolutionary days in Old New York. Its tight bodice, bouffant skirt and slightly puffed effect and opening down the front all bespeak the charm of olden days.

Silver cloth forms the slip, while silver ribbon outlines the black taffeta and connects the deep border of silver toned mousseline. A broad velvet bow in old blue lends an effective note at the front of the waist.

Combinations of color are found particularly effective in the new evening gowns. A recent exhibition of Paris gowns revealed a black taffeta stunningly embroidered, worn over a slip of apricot moire. The new blues and greens, too, were smartly featured while the June bride was remembered by several charming versions of the bouffant gown in white taffeta and lace.

The afternoon frock is also correctly designed in lines suitable to taffetas. The snug bodice and full skirt, being the favorite mode for taffeta frills and flounces, also are seen and the lines in general are quaint and distinctly feminine.

Ensembles, featuring straightline frocks in soft taffetas, and coat linings to match, are another feature of the spring wardrobe. The taffeta coat and cape are not unknown and are featured along with the sports costumes of taffeta which are new this season.

Embroidery, in colorful designs, plays an important part in the taffeta frock whether it be for afternoon or evening. Beads, tinsel, silk and wool are used with equal success and supply a feature of importance.

Sleeves, though important in the mode, are frequently neglected in both afternoon and evening frocks, as the lines which are chosen for taffeta do not look well with full sleeves. Taffeta does not fall with sufficient grace for the long sleeves, so when sleeves are used they are either brief in outline or appear in a chiffon or crepe material in matching tone, or in closely fitted effects.

Taffeta hats are exceptionally new and smart in the spring millinery and add a matching note to the afternoon frock worn beneath the newest wrap. Colors, always effective in taffeta, are seen to advantage in the new shades which are so very becoming this year.
