REEDSPORT WATER SUPPLY RESTORED AFTER THREE DAYS

Due to a cave-in 200 feet within the 1100 foot tunnel, to Clear Lake, sections of the twelve-inch main pipe buckled and the water supply to the city of ReedSPORT was interrupted for three days during the past week, says the Port Umpqua Courier.

Repairs were being made Sunday morning at the entrance of the tunnel to care for the slides that had occurred. When the water pressure buckled the pipe, the tunnel was flooded to such an extent that over sixty lineal feet of tunnel caved in.

Immediate steps were taken to repair the broken pipe, but the continued efforts of men working day and night did not change the situation. After two days and two nights of steady work the pipes were connected.

Assistance was given by the Winchester Bay logging company who had their entire crew at the scene, with tools and equipment to facilitate the repairs.

Practically every industry in the city was placed out of order by the breakdown. The whole source of water supply to the Winchester Bay mill was cut off. Consequently the big steam turbine generating power for the West Coast Power company was tied up, which in turn caused the many industries of the city dependent upon electricity to be closed down.

Due to the fact that salt water is not used in the modern turbines, the supply of salt or river water could in no circumstances be utilized, according to the statement of J. Wheeler, manager of the West Coast Power company.

Hotel and rooming houses were hard hit by the failure of the water supply. Restaurants and confectioneries of the city were hard pressed to secure water from the springs and wells nearby.

Automobiles and trucks were requisitioned and hauled water for them. Continual lines of house-holders packing buckets to the springs at the foot of the hills near ReedSPORT could be seen during the three days of the water shortage.

Just how much of an economic loss occurred during the past three days cannot be accurately estimated. It is judged, however, that approximately \$2500 per day was lost to the workers in the sawmill and planing mills of the city. In addition the creameries, and other manufacturing plants were shut down. It is estimated that the economic loss was approximately \$3000 each day.

CARRIES TON DOUBLE MILE FOR 400 PINS

Would you carry 2,000 pounds of merchandise more than 2 miles in exchange for a three-cent paper of pins? That, in effect, is exactly what a railroad has to do, according to J. H. Dyer, general manager for Southern Pacific Company. And as the company annually uses 12,649,000 pins, 31,600 papers in all the matter of pin economy receives close attention.

In 1925 the company received an average revenue of 1.352 cents for hauling a ton of freight one mile. That, a ton of freight must be hauled approximately 2.3 miles to produce enough gross revenue sufficient to purchase three cents worth of pins. That, however, is only half the story.

As operating expenses alone use up roughly 71 percent of the gross revenue, the railroad must haul a ton of freight approximately 7 and 1/2 miles before it can get into the market and purchase the paper of pins. Out of the remaining 29 percent has to come overhead and taxes.

"The price of pins," said Dyer, "illustrates the amazing importance of little things in railroad hauling. By having pins made of steel instead of the usual brass, we were able to save more than \$1,500 a year."

"Hundreds of little economies such as reusing old twine from incoming packages, making baggage mats out of worn-out air hose and utilizing old locomotive boiler tubes for telephone conduit effect savings of tens of thousands of dollars annually. These standards of rigid economy, extending into every phase of railroad operation and administration, are largely responsible for the fact that railroads still are able to show small profits instead of deficits."

OLD VOLCANO HAS BECOME GREAT LAKE

One of the most wonderful, if not the most wonderful, of nature's exploits is to be found just beyond Medford on the line of the Southern Pacific in southern Oregon at an altitude of over seven thousand feet above sea level.

Crater Lake, as its name implies, lies in the vast crater of an extinct volcano. The approach fills one with a mysterious awe which is intensified when the rim is reached and the grandeur of the mirror-like lake is revealed suddenly to view.

It is a sapphire sea of silence and mystery whose waters are as blue as a Caprian sky viewed from a lofty eminence far above the clouds.

GOOD PROGRESS BEING MADE ON UMPQUA HIGHWAY

REEDSPORT, Ore., June 19.—Progress of the work upon the Umpqua highway is satisfactory and proceeding at a rate which will cause the road to be completed on contract time, according to word from Gilmore.

The worst portion of rock work upon the Umpqua highway has been completed and the work that is to follow will require less time to handle. Nevertheless, there is a large amount in the uncompleted portion of the highway, but it is of such a nature that it will not require so much time to handle.

Whether the shoveling can be carried on at a rapid rate will be determined by the character of the rock and soil in which the workmen encounter.

The rocky point which necessitated the removal of about 7,000 cubic yards of rock, has been mastered and the machine moved forward. The steam shovel which has been working upon the job is kept going day and night and a tremendous amount of yardage is cleared for.

The continued dry weather has facilitated the removal of the dirt and less delay is met with in transferring it from one point to another.

Indications that once the sea-shore was along the plane followed by the present Umpqua highway was discovered by workmen during the past week. They uncovered a peculiar formation of strata which indicated that at one time the shore line had been along that level.

Sea shells of various kind were found in the strata which further bore out the surmise.

It was shown also that the strata was broken off along the edge of the highway and that the hill either had been raised, or else the water had washed and worn away the remainder of the hill.

No other formation of like character has been reported by the workmen while employed upon this portion of the highway.

The rock which the roadway is cut through is of a conglomerate of sand and other matter causing it to be hard to handle. They have, however, finished the hard portion of the road at present.

BUTTERFLIES AND MOTHS—THIS WOMAN'S BUSINESS.

MIAMI, Fla., June 18.—Clad in a khaki skirt and a wide brimmed straw hat and armed with a net and bag a serious little Miami woman of slight build and white hair goes forth each day in search of butterflies and moths. For collecting and breeding the beautifully marked specimens of this species of insect is a business with Mrs. Elizabeth O. Groves. She has one of the largest laboratories of its nature in the country.

She received orders for rare butterflies from scientific institutions and colleges that specialize in nature study, from jewelers and collectors.

During her first season she sold more than \$400 worth of the tiny blue winged butterfly that feeds on the coontie. This is said to be a rare specimen in other sections, but common in Florida.

Mrs. Groves also collects grasshoppers. One order was for 100 grasshoppers. She doesn't know what they were wanted for, but each was worth three cents.
