AUTOIST DROWNS IN KLAMATH FALLS IRRIGATION CANAL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 21.—C. T. Boynton, of Portland, was drowned yesterday afternoon when his automobile plunged off a narrow road into the main canal of the Klamath Irrigation district which flows through this city. Boynton coasted down a steep hill and attempted to make a sharp turn at the canal. His car failed to negotiate the curve and plunged off the road into the canal turning completely over once and lighting right side up in the canal. Boynton was apparently knocked unconscious and thrown out of the car. His body was swept down the canal several hundred feet and finally recovered by city patrolman Louis H. Brown, who plunged into the water after it. This is the fourth fatal automobile accident in Klamath Falls during the past three weeks.

When the cow is comfortable and contented, says the Oregon experiment station, she responds with a flow of milk far in excess of that which she gives when she is uncomfortable and irritated. In June weather cows give a larger amount of milk than in the cold and wintry weather. If producing all the rest of the year, in stall and barn conditions as nearly possible like those of June—in warmth, light, ventilation with sunlight and succulent foods like silage and roots to replace June grasses—bessy responds with a generous flow of milk.

Sourness in soils is produced as the natural result of the decay of organic matter. It is well known that on some newly cleared Oregon timberland many crops do not do well. A sound system of production can be established on a new piece of land that will not produce satisfactory cover crop by using limestone applications, reports the experiment station.

Soil till, cultivation and moisture control are greatly aided by application of limestone.

Panorama of President's Vacation Spot Shows Life in Wild Beauty

PAUL SMITH'S N. Y., June 21.—The church at Paul Smith's, the nearest settlement to President Coolidge's summer White House, is St. John's-in-the-Wilderness, Episcopal. It is a tiny edifice of logs, built and maintained by the fashionable summer colony, which each season employs a city choir and prominent clergymen for the services. The nearest Congregational church is at Malone, thirty-eight miles north of White Pine Camp. There is a Presbyterian church at Keesebrouck, two miles away, and numerous churches of various denominations at Saranac Lake village, thirteen miles distant. President Coolidge is almost sure to have unwelcome visitors, for even the secret service men can't keep away the black flies that lay siege to the Adirondack woods late in June and early in July. Residents take consolation in the comparative brevity of their season. The view from White Pine Camp on Osgood Lake is limited to the water and to the irregular, low-lying fringe of the wilderness that extends northward for twelve miles from the water's edge. However, some of the most noteworthy scenery of the Adirondacks is spread in a grand panorama from the state highway not far from the private road leading into the Kirkwood preserve. Marcy, the state's highest mountain, McKinstry, Whiteface to the northeast, St. Regis Mountain to the west, Wolf Jawns and Amperand, are some of the other mighty profiles with which the President will become familiar as he camps in the vicinity of the camp.

Deer are so plentiful in the Paul Smith's sector that their appearance is taken as a matter of course by the natives and the summer residents. Moose and elk long since disappeared and the killing of the last panther is recalled only by the oldest guides. Black bear are increasingly numerous.

In addition to J. R. Kirkwood, who owns the White Pine Camp, lodges are maintained on the lake shores by Wilfred McLaughlin of Montreal, E. Bruce Godfree of New York City, D. W. Francis of Philadelphia and Tulsa, Okla., and M. V. Cranford of Brooklyn. The estates, however, do not encompass the lake, which nestles in a solitude that is broken only by the sound of the wind in the pines and the calls of the birds.

President Cleveland, Harrison and Roosevelt visited the Adirondacks. President Cleveland's favorite trout stream was Ray Brook, not far from Saranac Lake.

Ross and pickered abound in Osgood Lake. In Lower St. Regis, close at hand, are lake and brook trout.

President Coolidge will find the real wilderness only a stone's throw from his quarters. The road from the state highway to the camp was built years ago through two and a half miles of virgin timber from which no cuttings have since been made. Just across the lake, a distance of hardly half a mile, the forest again takes possession and extends unbroken for twelve miles northward.

This vast stretch of woodland is traversed solely by the Lake Placid-Malone highway which runs about a mile to the west of White Pine Camp. The forest clings persistently to the flanks of the road.
