CATTLE KILLED BY SPRAY USED BY THE RAILROAD COMPANY.

CANYONVILLE, June 21, 1926. Editor News-Review: Regarding the exaggerated account of the deer being poisoned by the spray used along the S. P. right of way, I wish to state:

A few weeks ago I was driving a bunch of cattle from Wolf Creek to Canyonville. While holding them, to pick up a few more, some fed out along the track. As it happened, the S. P. car of spray had been side tracked there, just before. We lost six head of stock in less than an hour after they had licked the flies and ballast between. The cattle were salt hungry and pawed between the ties and licked the dirt.

The section boss and crew signed a statement, after making an examination, that the cattle were poisoned from the car while on siding, so we could put in our claim for damages. There is no question about it killing anything that eats it.
