CONVENTION OF EDITORS TO BE HERE NEXT YEAR

The state press association, was re-elected and also named director of the John Henry Knight Press foundation.

Five regional vice-presidents were elected. They were: George Alfico, Ontario; J. W. Bates, Roseburg; R. R. Cronise, Albany; Lee Gordon, Marshfield, and R. H. Jones, Prineville.

Repeal of existing bond certification laws and enactment of improved legislation in their place was recommended in a resolution adopted by the convention as a means of relieving farmers in irrigation districts who are said to be threatened with the loss of their homes.

Improvement and correction of laws on the initiative and referendum were also urged.

Other resolutions thanked the citizens of Prineville for the entertainment offered the visitors; recommended that the word Oregon be spelled out in news dispatches; condemned the government printing of return cards on envelopes; secured efforts made to muzzle the press; endorsed the John Henry Knight Press foundation and the completion of the national highway No. 28, which runs through Prineville and connects the use of free publicity through the newspapers.

Congratulations were extended to Colin V. Dymond on his return to Oregon from a sojourn in France. The convention closed at night.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 21.—An officer has a right to search an automobile if he has a reasonable belief that it contains liquor, even if he has no search warrant, Federal Judge R. S. Bean held today. Judge Bean overruled the motion of Royal Weckert for suppressing evidence, which consisted of several dozen bottles of liquor, which it was charged were taken from Weckert's car. FIRE CHIEFS OF OREGON MAY ASK STATE COLLEGE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) CORVALLIS, Ore., June 21.—The Oregon State Fire Chiefs' association's annual convention got under way here today with a big attendance of chiefs, many of them accompanied by one or two men of their respective departments.

An important matter of legislation before the chiefs is establishment of an Oregon Firemen's College at Corvallis. This college would be held here each year, and diplomas awarded at the close of the allotted period of training. It is contemplated that the Oregon Agricultural College of engineering would dovetail with this work.

A committee is expected to be appointed to take the matter before the next session of the state legislature to secure an appropriation. It was reported that fire insurance rating bureaus are behind this move, and that Oregon chiefs favor it.

Chief L. G. Holden of the Portland fire department spoke before a large audience at the Christian church last night. He declared that although big fire departments as a rule are underpaid there is that untiring spirit of loyalty in each man that makes him perform his duty with no thought of pecuniary reward, but rather as the desire to give service and be of benefit to his fellow men.

FARM COMMITTEE GIVES UP HOPE OF AID THIS SESSION

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, June 21.—Indicating it had no hope of further effort in the House to enact farm relief legislation this session, the senate passed the McNary corn belt bill, the house agricultural committee adjourned today until next December.

By a vote of 100 to 131, house opponents to adjournment of congress on June 30 won an initial round in the house today by sending the adjournment resolution, sponsored by house Republican leaders, to the house ways and means committee for consideration. This blocks, temporarily at least, the effort to get a definite adjournment date.

Income tax payments due June 15 will total about \$100,000,000 or almost \$70,000,000 more than was received a year ago, it was estimated today by the treasury.

GAMBLER ROUNDUP IN PORTLAND NETS ONLY 4 OUT OF 42

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, Ore., June 21.—Carrying a sheet of warrants calling for the arrest of 42 persons on charges of gambling, an expedition of officers of the law, headed by Chief Criminal Deputy Sheriff Christofferson, and guided by agents of Rev. Clement G. Clarke, set forth this morning to round up the accused. The warrants were issued on indictments returned last week at the instance of Rev. Clarke, who is pastor of the First Congregational church, and who has been demanding official action against gambling in Portland.

The officers went through Chinatown, where addresses had been given, but places where it had been alleged that gambling games and lotteries had been conducted were mostly deserted. Four arrests were made up to noon.

The officers visited a number of places in their search and found evidence of gambling in several. Lottery tickets and gambling equipment were seen, but the operators of the places were missing in a few instances the officers forced doors. As one door was forced open buzzers sounded throughout the establishment. In another place was a outlet through the roof for quick escape in case of a raid.
