VOTERS CHOOSE GEDDES, FINLAY AND SHOEMAKER

**Win by More Than 2-to-1
Over Their Rivals at
School Election.**

BALLOTING IS LIGHT

Contest Mildly Enlivened
by Opposition Through
Form of Writing in
Trio of Names.

A secret and well organized opposition to the printed ticket appeared in yesterday's school election, making an interesting contest, which, however, was won by the three candidates regularly nominated. A. J. Geddes was chosen director for the two year term and G. C. Finlay and B. R. Shoemaker for the three year term.

An opposition, working quietly, but organized even to the point of circulating a printed ticket among those held to be favorably inclined, submitted the names of S. L. DeLapp in opposition to A. J. Geddes, and W. S. Hamilton and W. L. Cobb as opposed to Shoemaker and Finlay.

This opposition force, apparently counting upon an exceptionally light vote, polled nearly 150 of the 200 votes cast. It is evident from the nature of the proceedings that this force chose to work quietly and under cover, rather than nominate its candidates openly, relying upon a light vote to permit the election of its candidates by writing in the names upon the ballot.

The fact, however, that there were nearly 400 voters out for the election, indicating a growing interest in school affairs, gave a victory for the regular ticket by a better than 2 to 1 vote.

In spite of the fact that only 390 effective votes were cast, the number is indicative of a great interest in school affairs. The number is less than one-third of the qualified voters within the district but with no apparent opposition in the selection of directors it was not anticipated that there would be many voters at the polls, and, in fact, a far smaller vote had been anticipated.

Director Geddes, one of the present members of the board, who was a candidate for reelection for the short term, received 260 votes, while Dr. DeLapp, present chairman, whose name was written in, was given 117 votes. W. S. Hamilton received 11 votes for the short term, W. L. Cobb 4 and Al Cresson 1.

For the three year term Dr. B. R. Shoemaker was given 253 votes, Dr. G. C. Finlay 256, W. S. Hamilton 119, W. L. Cobb 133, H. S. French 1, S. L. DeLapp 2, A. Cresson 1, Mrs. Louis Kohlhaugen 1, Clinton Goring 1, B. W. Cooney 1 and Foster Barker 1.

The officers of the election were H. S. French, chairman; Iva Taylor, Ethel Bailey, Judges; Mrs. V. J. Miedell, clerk.

Eugene Names Directors.
EUGENE, Ore., June 22.—W. A. Atkins and A. R. Gray were elected to the Eugene board of education yesterday, defeating Rev. Frederick G. Jennings and Dr. R. H. Fields. Campaigning was heated prior to the election and as a result, a heavy vote was cast.

Proposed to install a chemistry department in the Eugene high school was approved by the voters.

La Grande Recount Likely
LA GRANDE, Ore., June 22.—In one of the most heated school elections here in years, Dr. R. P. Landis and Robert Eakin, local attorney, were elected, according to the official count. Landis polled 431, Eakin 433, L. W. Weeks 402 and John Hodge 198. Weeks, who has served as school director for several years, will decide today whether he will ask for a recount.

38 Vote at Medford.
MEDFORD, Ore., June 22.—In a school election held Tuesday there were only 38 votes. The three candidates had no opposition. It is the first time in ten years that the annual school election here has not been marked by heated struggles and a heavy vote.

STARMER BOOSTS PRUNE CROP.
There will be no shortage of prunes in Douglas county, predicts Sam Starmar, sheriff, who is on official trip to the metropolis. The prune orchards of the Umpqua valley are now loaded down with a maximum amount of the fruit. The strawberry season, which has just closed, was also a money-maker for the growers of that county. —Portland Oregonian.

Tunney Picked by Rickard To Fight Dempsey

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
NEW YORK, June 22.—Tex Rickard informed the New York state athletic commission today that he had selected Gene Tunney to meet Jack Dempsey for the world's heavyweight championship at Yankee Stadium on September 16 and offered to post \$50,000 that the winner would meet Harry Wills. Action on Rickard's proposal was deferred by the board.

Rickard told the commission that under no consideration would he promote a Dempsey-Tunney fight this year. He said he had made iron clad contracts with Tunney and the champion and already had advanced both fighters money.

If the commission declined to approve the Dempsey-Tunney match as a Yankee Stadium fight, Rickard said he would take the contest elsewhere. This was accepted as indicating that refusal to sanction the match would result in the transfer of the bout to Rickard's Jersey City arena, Boyles Thirty Acres.

Rickard served notice on the commission that his decision to promote the Dempsey-Tunney fight was his final word on the subject. He left the building after the interview.

SEATTLE WANTS FORMER STONE STORE MANAGER

**Bad Check Charge Lodged
Against Clarence Sabin
Who Left Recently.**

AUTO WAS BOUGHT

**Bank Reports Numerous
Worthless Checks Issued
—Last Came From
Oakland, Cal.**

Clarence E. Sabin, former manager of the Stone grocery in this city, and who has been sought by his bondsmen for several weeks, since his departure from this city, is wanted in Seattle, where a warrant for his arrest has been issued on a charge of passing bad checks. Sabin disappeared from Roseburg quite suddenly a few weeks ago, and is understood to have taken several hundred dollars of the company's money with him. As he was under bond the matter was turned over to the bonding company, which has been conducting a quiet search in an effort to locate him.

According to a letter received by Chief of Police Ketch from Seattle, Mr. Sabin gave a check for \$1,250 on the Roseburg National bank, and purchased a Willys-Knight roadster. It is stated in the letter that he stole a set of Washington license plates from a salesman.

It was stated at Seattle that he had a woman accompanying him at the time he was in that city, and the police there are endeavoring to check up on her.

Although the search for Mr. Sabin has been on for over a month, local officers were not called upon for assistance until today, when Seattle authorities requested that an investigation be made here.

According to statements made by Chief of Police Ketch in reporting his findings, Mr. Sabin's check operations have been quite widespread. It is reported that the bank has received quite a number of worthless checks, coming from various points along the Pacific coast. He came through Roseburg cashing one check at Sutherland's. The check was received from Oakland, California, on June 10, the check having been drawn in favor of the Skaggs grocery and on the Roseburg National bank. It was written on June 5.

Mr. Sabin is very well known in Roseburg having been an efficient manager of the Stone branch store in this city for nearly eighteen months.

He left here suddenly about a month ago, and officers have been informed that a check of his books has revealed shortages amounting to several hundred dollars, although the exact sum has not yet been made known.

He was traced north, and was thought to be heading for Canada, but with the purchase of a car he evidently turned south, and slipped through Roseburg on his way to California, where his check would indicate that he was operating.

GROWING PARTS OF CITY ASKING BETTER LIGHTS

**Extension of System Used
on Cass and Jackson Up
to the Council.**

EXPENSE IS PROBLEM

**Realty Acquired on Liens
Lacks Buyers Because
Title Available Is
Not Complete.**

Street lights similar to those on Cass and Jackson streets are desired on Stephens street as far as the intersection with Mosher. A petition asking for the installation of such lights was presented to the council last night at the regular meeting and was referred to the committee on electric lights for further investigation.

Stephens street, which is the route of the highway, has been building up rapidly and is now an important business section. A number of fine store buildings have been erected and new improvements have been made while several further changes are in prospect for the near future. The development of the street has brought about a need for more efficient lighting, which is asked in the petition signed by every property owner.

Although the matter was referred to the committee on electric lights doubt was expressed by the council as to the possibility of granting the request. The installation of such lights would be very expensive and at the present time the city's finances are not such that the council could appropriate a sum sufficient for the installation. An investigation, however, will be made and if a way of financing the improvement can be found the request will undoubtedly be granted.

The light committee was also instructed to place a light in the library park. A cable is to be stretched from the library building to the rear of the Perkins building and a light suspended in the center of the grounds.

Considerable discussion centered around methods of securing a safe title to lands held by the city on delinquent foreclosures. The city holds several thousand dollars worth of valuable real estate which has been seized because of failure to pay liens. This property has been sold to the city at public foreclosure sales and has been held, in some cases, for several years. In selling the land the city can only give a marshal's deed, which many investors do not hold to be sufficient, so the city plans to clear title on all land now held so that it can be sold. A proposal to buy several lots in North Roseburg was made last night by A. S. Coen, but a warranty deed was demanded, which the city was unable to furnish.

A special committee composed of Councilmen Wade and Hes was appointed by Mayor Houck to meet with the City Attorney and work out some suitable plan for clearing titles so that the city may dispose of the property now being held.

The council spent considerable time in discussion of routine matters, but no important action was taken, other than referring the affairs to committees for investigation. One matter of the disposition of bond premiums, which was considered at the next meeting. The council recently held a bond sale, receiving a premium of more than \$2,000, which money must be credited to some fund by order of the council.

Greatest Assemblage Of Women In History Marks Their Day At Eucharist

CHICAGO, June 22.—The greatest assemblage of women ever gathered within one enclosure in America banked the stands in Soldiers Field today at the second public session of the international eucharistic congress. It was women's day—and the vast arena harbored less than 5,000 men in the 180,000 worshippers.

Cloudless skies greeted the fair throngs and the sun shone brilliantly.

Solemn pontifical mass at the great outdoor altar was celebrated by the Most Rev. Joseph Palles, archbishop of Philipp and vice regent of Rome.

A woman's choir of 15,000, including 5,000 hooded nuns, chanted the "Missa Rosa Mystica," the famous mass of Nino Comelli.

Tens of thousands of women marched to the stadium as early as seven o'clock. The throngs overflowed the concrete stands and pressed into the space reserved for the clergy and choir in the great sweep of the grass carpeted field.

The crowd outside was not so great as yesterday and the procession of clergy filed into the field on schedule.

One large section of the stand was filled with nuns, whose black veils and white caps, were in striking contrast to the field of red, blue, gray, and green hats of women.

Piffi Speaks In German.
Like yesterday, the program of addresses was begun before the mass was celebrated. The first was by the Archbishop of Vienna, Cardinal Frederick Piffi, clad in his scarlet robes of office and standing in a red velvet covered pulpit in front of the altar. He spoke in German, his resonant voice being heard distinctly in the far distances down the stretches of Soldiers Field.

As Cardinal Piffi spoke the staves in front of the altar, previously kept clear, was filled with clergy for whom no seats could be found.

Praise For Women.
Archbishop Edward J. Hanna of San Francisco, preached the sermon. He described the assemblage as the greatest honor to woman-kind in history.

"To Catholic women is our message on this day of triumph. Never since the pages of history have recorded the deeds of mankind, has woman held the place of power she holds today.

"Never has this power reached such a commanding away as it does at this moment in our loved land—she is the mother of the race, she makes the first, the most indelible impression on the budding mind of the child.

"Her love makes her the ideal of the child's life. As life runs on she is the guide, she is the upholder of life's high traditions of noble effort.

"When men fall in life's stressing conflict, she speaks words of comfort, of courage and sends her men back to fight anew. In her love of God and of Christ is mayhap the mightiest force for the triumph of truth, of justice, of mercy and of love, and above all things the mightiest power for the victory of that purity of mind and of heart which gives beauty to all else.

"Into your hands, memorable in the annals of the history of the church, I entrust Christ's priceless gift to his brethren, to her children."

**Light Berry Crop
Indicates Price
Boost This Fall**

PORTLAND, Ore., June 22.—From present indications the 1926 pack of berries and soft fruits will be exceptionally light with corresponding high prices this fall. Canberries are running short of fruit and offering premiums in an effort to obtain sufficient stocks for order. The largest packers in the north west are actually refusing to take any more orders, especially on strawberry packs.

All of these packers call attention to the fact that they have numerous customers who have not yet covered their requirements, and they simply haven't the fruit left to take care of this trade when they do decide to buy.

Barrelling took a large portion of the strawberry crop from both Oregon and Washington. Rains during May damaged the crop in this state and prevented proper pollination of Etterbergs and Marshalls. The Etterbergs crop was only about forty per cent of normal.

The total pack of gooseberries is considerably less than last year. The crop of black raspberries is hardly normal and canberries are receiving low black caps on their contracts with the growers due to better prices elsewhere.

There is a good crop of red raspberries in both Oregon and Washington. Harvest is now well under way with the berries still small but firm and nice. A large portion of the crop has been sold in barrels, where market continues firm.

Loganberries appear plentiful again this year. Pack is proceeding rapidly in this state, but just starting in Washington. The Oregon crop is large with the fruit excellent quality. Vinous, however, are heavily loaded that berries are medium in size. There may be some difficulty in completing orders for large fancy stock. Canberries in this state are now running to capacity to complete orders for the United Kingdom. Whether there will be a surplus or not, will not be determined for another week or more.

The total crop of Royal Ann cherries is slightly larger than expected, but the cool weather the last few days is causing the fruit to ripen more slowly and smaller. The cherry crop is going to be entirely lost to the fresh market.

KELLY AND WILLOS LOSE ON APPEALS IN SUPREME COURT

SALEM, Ore., June 22.—Ellsworth Kelly and James Willos, must die on the gallows for their part in the prison break of last August 12 in which John Sweeney and J. M. Holman, guards, were killed. The supreme court today, in an opinion by Justice Burnett, affirms the lower court for Marion county where the case was tried before Judge Percy H. Kelly and a jury returned a verdict of guilty of first degree murder. They were subsequently sentenced to be hanged.

It will now be necessary for the two men to be resentenced to death after the mandate is returned to the lower court.

Tom Murray, who fired the shot that killed Sweeney and who was tried separately and sentenced to death, committed suicide in his cell at the penitentiary on May 9 last, before his appeal had been argued in the supreme court.

Anti-Hanging Bill Too Old.

SALEM, Ore., June 22.—Petitions signed in 1924 for the initiation of a bill to abolish capital punishment in Oregon cannot be used for the initiation of such a bill this year, according to an opinion of Attorney General Van Winkle written for Secretary of State Kozier. The measure did not go on the ballot in 1924 and the sponsors of the anti-capital punishment movement hoped that it would not be necessary to re-initiate the petitions again as far as the names signed two years ago are concerned. But the ruling of the attorney general is that all names must be secured anew. The sponsor of the movement is the Progressive Civilization League.

FORMER RESIDENTS OF COUNTY VISIT ON WAY TO MEXICO

Mrs. O. H. Solpe and Mrs. John H. Smith, for many years residents of Douglas county now residing in Portland, spent last night in the city as the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Waite. The two ladies are on their way to old Mexico, making the trip by auto. Mrs. Solpe is the daughter of James Stark, one of the pioneers of the county, and resided at Elkhorn for many years. Mrs. Smith was formerly Anna Brain, daughter of John C. Brain, and granddaughter of Charles Brain, the founder of the city of that name. Both of the ladies have many friends in this city and enjoyed brief visits with several of them before continuing on their trip.

WET PLATFORM PROVES WINNER IN MINNESOTA

**Maas, Aged 28, Victor Over
Keller, Congressman
of Four Terms.**

AT G. O. P. PRIMARY

**Maine Favors Governor on
Proposed Law Taking
Private Schools
Off Aid List.**

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 22.—Magnus Johnson, once a Farmer-Labor senator from Minnesota, was in a close race today with Tom Davis of Minneapolis for the Farmer-Labor gubernatorial nomination. Belated returns late today turned a close race into a seeming victory, for 2,446 of the state's 3,589 precincts gave him 58,578 votes compared with 51,950 for Tom Davis of Minneapolis, his opponent.

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 22.—Minnesota Republicans have nominated as their first prohibition modification advocate to congress a 28-year old man, the youngest ever chosen by the state for that office. They also renominated Governor Theodore Christianson.

Melvin J. Maas, the victor in yesterday's primary, polled as many votes as his two opponents together to win the nomination in the fourth district, which includes St. Paul.

Governor Christianson, running again on an "economy platform," on which he was elected two years ago, defeated Mayor George E. Leach of Minneapolis, for the gubernatorial nomination.

Magnus Johnson Ahead
In the other major state race, for the Farmer-Labor gubernatorial nomination, Magnus Johnson, former United States senator, and Tom Davis, Minneapolis attorney, were running a close race with Johnson several hundred votes in the lead, with about one-sixth of the state heard from.

The Democrats had an unopposed state and therefore did not appear on the ballots in the primary. Maas, who favored modification to permit light wines and beer, but no saloons, ousted Representative Oscar E. Keller, elected to congress four times from the fourth district.

Maine Governor Wins
PORTLAND, Me., June 22.—Governor Ralph C. Brewster has been renominated by Maine Republicans. He led his opponent, Mayor Arthur L. Thayer, of Bangor, from the first returns of yesterday's primary. Today his margin was 14,430, with the votes of small towns missing.

Mayor Thayer made the chief issue of his campaign against Governor Brewster a constitutional amendment prohibiting the appropriation of public funds for private schools and other institutions, passed by the last legislature and to come before the voters at the state election in September.

Brewster won his nomination and election two years ago on a platform favoring such an amendment, and in that campaign was openly supported by the Ku Klux Klan. Congressman Ira G. Hersey, Republican, was renominated by a wide margin over Benjamin W. Blanchard. Other candidates for congress were unopposed. Ernest L. McLean, mayor of Augusta, received the Democratic nomination for governor without opposition.

MONROE DOCTRINE MAY BE EMULATED BY PAN-AMERICA

PANAMA, June 22.—A resolution recommending common action by the Pan American states against any aggressor state has been unanimously adopted by the Pan American congress here.

The resolution drafted by Senator Arias of Uruguay recommends that the nations of the new world to adopt as a policy of international relations the principle that every act carried out against any of them in violation of precepts universally recognized by international law be considered an offense to all these states and therefore to provoke uniform and common reaction by all.

Shasta Thru Roseburg Not To Be Changed

Shasta, the select train between Portland and San Francisco, will continue to operate through Roseburg under the same name and without change, regardless of what use may be made of the Natron cut-off, according to information given out by J. E. Clark, local freight and passenger agent today, following the receipt of advice from headquarters. Shasta has long been one of the favorite trains between Portland and San Francisco and has become so well known that its discontinuance would mean a heavy loss to the company. The company plans, Mr. Clark states, to operate two Shasta routes, the present one to be continued without change under the name "Shasta Route-Siskiyou Line." The route from Eugene to Black Butte, California, by way of Klamath Falls, will be known as "Shasta Route-Cascade Line."

President of Pennsylvania W. C. T. U. Says Over \$100,000 Spent.

WASHINGTON, June 22.—With the treasury overflowing with money beyond the fondest hopes of estimators, President Coolidge has turned thumbs down on tax reduction talk until the new revenue law is submitted to the test of operation during the coming year.

The President informed his cabinet officers and bureau chiefs at the semi-annual budget meeting last night that this fiscal year, ending June 30, probably would be closed with a surplus of \$390,000,000. Indications also pointed to margins of \$185,000,000 next fiscal year and \$20,000,000 at the end of the succeeding twelve months, he said, but he withheld promise of tax reduction pending thorough study of the workings of the new law.

The \$390,000,000 surplus, calculated yesterday on the basis of latest returns from second installment income tax payments, is almost four times the amount forecast six months ago.

Income Tax Money Greater.
Income tax returns for this quarter are expected to reach \$440,000,000, almost \$70,000,000 more than was collected for the corresponding period last year despite the higher tax rates, which prevailed then. March receipts of \$505,000,000 also were much higher than a year ago, in hite face of reduction in taxes just authorized by congress. These increased returns are large collections of back taxes, amounting to \$350,000,000, are held by Mr. Coolidge and the treasury to account in large part for the unusual surplus.

The surplus will be applied to the public debt, bringing the total reduction for this fiscal year to about \$336,000,000. This will leave debt at \$19,500,000,000.

Coolidge Is Cautious.
"It would be unfortunate to raise hopes of further tax relief until we are sure that the state of our finances justifies it," President Coolidge told the meeting. There is no such surety today. Business was quick to anticipate the last tax reduction. It was justified in doing so. To raise such hopes at this time might be to encourage business to anticipate again, as it did in 1925, further tax reduction. This might have a determined effect upon the stabilization of the country under the present tax law."

Reducing the Pay Roll.
Facing the necessity of public improvements such as the recently authorized buildings program, the President said, the government could not expect an "appreciable reduction" in total annual expenditures. (Continued from page 4)

DRYS TESTIFY TO MONEY USED TO AID PINCHOT

FISHER ALSO BACKED

**Pinchot Put Up Own Cash
for Letters Sent Out
Endorsing Him for
U. S. Senator.**

WASHINGTON, June 22.—Again leaving the main trail in its investigation of the Pennsylvania piggy bank case, the senate campaign funds committee today set out on a side excursion into the operations of the Pennsylvania Women's Christian Temperance Union.

Seeking to establish whether any campaign chest benefited by a large fund raised by that organization for prohibition enforcement work, Chairman Reed first called to the witness stand Mrs. Ella M. George, W. C. T. U. state president, who said it was the practice to appoint candidates for public office who are opposed to prohibition, and to use paid speakers.

Mrs. George estimates the income of the union at \$50,000 annually, made up of \$1 dues of the members. In order to get at the details Mrs. Leah Cobb Marion of Emporium, Penn., treasurer of the union, was called to the stand momentarily and she presented the annual report of the organization for 1925, showing receipts of \$31,337.

Pinchot Had to "Dig."
Continuing her testimony about campaign speakers, Mrs. George said she did some speaking herself, but received no pay other than the \$100 a month paid her as president. In the recent primary she said, the union supported Governor Pinchot in his unsuccessful campaign for the Republican senatorial nomination, and John S. Fisher for the Republican gubernatorial nomination. Letters supporting Pinchot were sent to the county and local presidents and to the county officers as well.

"Who paid the expense of sending these letters?" Reed asked.

"Pinchot paid it,"

She said she ran some Fisher matter into the Pinchot letters, and Reed asked:

"You fudged a little on Pinchot, did you?"

The witness only laughed.

\$131,000 Collected.
Advertising to the prohibition enforcement fund raised by the W. C. T. U., Mrs. George said she personally went to Pinchot and offered to raise the \$250,000 which the legislature failed to appropriate. This was in June, 1923.

A board of trustees administered the fund and make a full report of it, the witness asserted, adding that Mrs. Maude T. Seymour who had asked for an accounting, was unaware of that fact.

"Will you please tell me how much your association collected for this Pinchot fund?" Reed asked.

"We collected \$129,000 and something," Mrs. George replied.

"Up to what time?"

"Mrs. Marion said it was up to June 26 of this year."

Most For Salaries.
Mrs. George presented an audited account of the fund sent to Governor Pinchot, which showed total collections of \$100,481.26 from August 1, 1923, to April 6, 1926, with expenditures of \$100,377.75.
