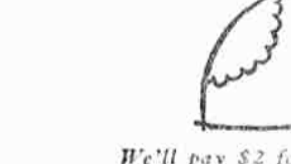
SUZANNE LENGLEN IS VICTOR OVER MARY K. BROWNE

SYLVIA GAINES' MURDERER MAY BE FORMER OFFENDER

(Associated Press Special Wire) SEATTLE, June 22.—Mr. and Mrs. F. S. Stokes, whom police believe saw the murderer of Miss Sylvia Gaines, have testified that Wallace Gaines, father of the girl, was not the man they saw. The procedure was requested by William Gaines, brother of Wallace, and chairman of King county commissioners, in order "to set at rest rumors connecting her father in the attack."

The Stokes picked out a photograph of a man who was arrested two years ago after an attack on a woman in the same vicinity and said it looked like the man they saw. American and Canadian police were asked to watch for this man.

Sheriff Starbuck has offered \$1,000 personal reward for the capture and conviction of the slayer of Miss Gaines. The American Legion petitioned King county commissioners to vote a \$5,000 reward.

ANSWERED LETTERS.

Mrs. C. B.—Olive oil can be used in place of a cleansing cream. The reason that creams are to be preferred to oils is because they have more body to them and therefore may be worked into the pores. This means more effectual cleansing or nourishing, according to the ingredients in the emulsion.

In a good cream all the ingredients are helpful to the skin or necessary to make a perfect formula; for instance, the fine white powders act somewhat like a seal holding the oils in the pores helping along the absorption; the rose water is also soothing to the skin, so much so, that it has cosmetic value even if it should be used alone. Oil, however, is the body of the cream, so nourishment or cleansing will result from using it, even though the other ingredients used to a cream formula are omitted.

Alma-Jerry—A person who has grown to adulthood is not apt to change the shape of knock knees, although this would not be impossible if a correct way of standing could be mastered and then maintained. Make correct posture a habit and the bones will grow into their correct positions. The body is constantly changing even to its bones. Braces are merely reminders so that correct position must be maintained.

Mrs. J. H.—Any kind of electric or massage treatment will help your little girl, so it is possible that the new mechanical exercise will be effective for her; however, you should consult your doctor and be guided by what he says about it. You might inquire at any of the hospitals about getting this treatment.

Fatty.—You do not need special exercises for developing portions of your body, all you need do is wait for your complete growth, when you will be evenly developed. A girl of 15 years of age with a height of five feet, three inches, should be slender, unless she is prematurely developed.

ANSWERS TO CORRESPONDENTS.

Two Routine Meals Good Scheme! "Miss Lillian: Advice regarding to me, I have not had or gained or over a year. As you request suggestions from your tonics, I want to tell you about my system which keeps me at the same weight, and perfectly well, too. "It is this: two routine or standard meals a day.

"I make my two standard meals my breakfast and evening meal, and at noon I take the balancing of my calories and eat anything I want. As I am only five feet, three inches tall, I do not need very much even then. My routine breakfast is two cups of oranges (150 to 200 C.) or the equivalent in some other raw fruit. For my supper, a cup of bouillon or weak tea, with a couple of crackers (ordinary crackers, 25 C. each, hold about 100 calories) if no sugar or cream used. My breakfast and supper are eaten as I want and I have no temptation to increase the amount having it definitely settled in my mind that that's what I'm going to have. So, I do not do, as you say, any arguing with myself.

"If I get too near the gaining margin, I change a day when I cannot be busy all afternoon, and just take a meal of noon similar to my evening meal. By noon, the next day, I have lost a half pound or so. I never allow myself to stay that long overweight. It's a great life."

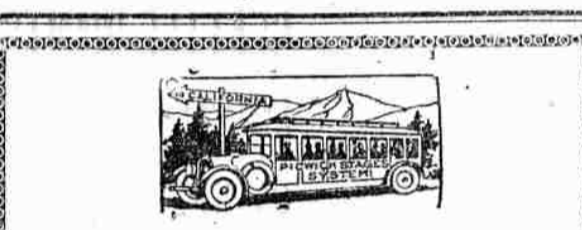
Your system is very good; I know for I have tried it myself and have recommended it. I find, as I said in my book on reducing, Diet and Health, that on the same amount of calories, you will apparently lose more if you have them early in the day, with very few calories at night. Still while you about the exact point to remember is to get your needed food elements some during the day.
