OREGON GUARDSMEN BATTLE WITH FIRE ON RIFLE RANGE

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

MEDFORD, Ore., June 22.—Oregon National Guardsmen at artillery practice on the range six miles north of Camp Jackson Monday afternoon and night, left their guns and rifles to battle a brush and grass fire that swept the 1,600-acre range. Practically 2,000 soldiers at the time were battling the flames, which were brought under control early this morning. An unconfirmed report this morning said that 25 or 30 of the guardsmen had been overcome with the heat while battling the flames. There were no serious cases.

The cause of the fire is unknown but is supposed to have been started from sparks from artillery fire. There was no fire on the tract when the troops arrived Monday morning.

The blaze for a time was threatening and was fanned by a brisk wind which made it difficult to combat. The troops were assisted by fire fighters and neighboring farmers.
