ROTARY DELEGATE HAS FINE TRIP

Charles S. McElhinny, new president of the Roseburg Rotary club, returning home Monday from the 17th annual convention of Rotary International at Denver, Colo., reported a splendid trip and an excellent time at the convention. Mr. McElhinny stated that the hospitality extended the visiting delegates by the host club was fine, and every effort for the comfort and entertainment of the visitors during their stay was made. The Oregon delegation, leaving Portland by train, stopped over at Salt Lake City enroute to the convention, and were guests of the Rotarians there for a day.

The visitors were met by a delegation of Denver Rotarians, Boy Scouts and the Olinger Highlanders, a boys' organization, and after the visitors had been taken to their rooms, golfing, sightseeing trips and many other diversions, arranged by the host club, were forms of entertainment. One of the outstanding features of the convention occurred on the opening evening when the "International Welcome Pageant" in which over one thousand people including two tribes of Indians, participated, was presented at the large Denver stadium, which seats 30,000 people, and which was crowded to capacity to witness the stupendous spectacle. A vast and colorful background, with many lights making a scene a brilliant one, was the setting for the pageant. Chief Canpolican, a nationally known Indian singer, was one of the participants in the pageant and the famous Black Horse Cavalry also took part.

Musical programs with many interesting entertainments went to make up the sessions each day. On June 16, the regular all day business session, the outstanding features were the talks given by Rotarians representing all nations. There were representatives at the convention from thirty-four nations excluding those from the United States. The first district dinner took place also on Wednesday at the Albany hotel, and was presided over by Governor Ed. Campbell, of Seattle.

Thursday, June 17, convention day, was devoted to business matters with a grand ball in the evening, honoring the international president, Donald A. Adams. Friday, called "Rotary Around the World," with speakers from all countries, an election of officers, closed the convention. Various entertainments were arranged for the diversion of those who stayed over Saturday.

es, and he proposed therefore a gradual reduction in personnel. "It is very easy to have too many people on the payroll," he said. "The reductions which have been made in personnel show no detrimental effect upon our results. Rather it has seemed to improve the efficiency of the service. I am encouraged in the thought that we can have further reduction of personnel without discharging a single person, by the simple device of not filling all the vacancies that occur. This would not operate in the summary separation of anyone from the federal service."

economy. Every dollar applied to the debt saves at least four cents a year in interest to the people of this and coming generations, he said.

Warning Uttered.

The President again reproached the state and local governments for their increased expenses, warning it was fraught with grave consequences. In 1921, he said, the cost of all government in this country was \$9,500,000,000, of which federal expenditure constituted about 60 per cent. In 1925 the cost of all government had increased to \$11,500,000,000 of which only 27 per cent was represented by federal expenditure.

While expenditures of the federal government probably will reach \$3,500,000,000 for the next fiscal year, Mr. Coolidge expressed a hope the following year could be concluded at a cost of \$3,200,000,000 exclusive of the Postal Service and tax refunds.

Personnel Reduction.

A reduction of at least two per cent in the number of federal employees next year was demanded by Director Lord of the Budget, with the approval of President Coolidge in his address to the meeting.

Such a slash in the federal personnel would mean a saving of \$20,000,000 next year, Mr. Lord said, and constitutes the chief departmental problem in the President's policy of "constructive economy."

The task can be accomplished, without the discharge of an employee but by the expedient of not filling vacancies. The number of vacancies in the civil service total about a per cent of the entire personnel each year.

On April 30 this year there were 248,419 executive civil service employees, exclusive of the postal people, Mr. Lord said, a reduction of 16,200 during President Coolidge's administration, and compared to 656,472 employees on the payroll at Armistice Day, November 11, 1918.

The President's program of expenditures for the next two fiscal years, the Director said, meant there must be the closest scrutiny of every expenditure.

"We must make each dollar sweat," he said.
