newspaper, was recognized. She greeted him with a smile, and asked him to notify Los Angeles police to protect her daughter, Roberta, whom she feared the abductors would attempt to kidnap. While she talked the woman lapsed many times into a semi-conscious state, due to her exhaustion.

Mother Nearly Hysterical.
LOS ANGELES, June 23.—Mrs. Minnie Kennedy this morning talked over the long distance telephone with the woman in the Douglas, Arizona, hospital, believed to be her daughter and as she hung up the receiver, said, "It is my daughter, Aimee Semple McPherson."

Highly excited and almost hysterical, Mrs. Kennedy began packing for a trip to Douglas and gave instructions that Mrs. McPherson's two children, Roberta and Rolf, be made ready to accompany her.

If train connections can be obtained without delay she will travel by rail, but if not, she will go in a fast police automobile.

Mrs. Kennedy was greatly agitated at the report that her daughter had been kidnapped.

"I can hardly believe that," she said. "If they kidnapped her and held her for ransom, why did they not come forward when we were offering a reward of \$25,000 for her return?"

She added that she had telegraphed the woman at Douglas to identify the children and describe them. "If she does that it will remove my last doubt," she declared.

Deputy District Attorney Joe Ryan announced that he was leaving today for Douglas, Ariz., to investigate every possible angle of the disappearance, and reappearance of Mrs. McPherson.

Lock of Hair Sent.

LOS ANGELES, June 23.—Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, mother of Aimee Semple McPherson, stated today that last night she received a letter containing what purported to be a lock of her daughter's hair and in which were replies to all the questions which she propounded several weeks ago as to what R. A. McKinley, blind attorney of Long Beach, informed District Attorney Asa Keyes that kidnappers had approached him to arrange for a ransom for the evangelist.

A \$25,000 reward offered for the safe return of Mrs. McPherson by Mrs. Kennedy was renewed on June 5 and the offer finally expired according to Mrs. Kennedy's announcement at that time, at mid-Mexican Governor Doubts.

LOS ANGELES, June 23.—Governor Abelardo Rodriguez of the northern district of lower California, with headquarters at Mexicali, across the boundary line from here, in a statement to the Associated Press today said he was positive that Aimee Semple McPherson, Los Angeles evangelist, had not been in either Mexicali or Tijuana, or in any other part of lower California, since her disappearance.

He accompanied a friend to a theater and to a lunch room after the play but protested he was "not very hungry."

"Long Duck" ate a whole roast fowl, three bowls of noodles and eight bowls of rice. "Long Duck" is eight feet six inches in height. Mrs. "Long Duck" is only seven feet tall.
