ORGANIZATION OF FRUIT GROWERS

RENT PLANNED

horticultrual standards in the

county and in enforcing the state

law covering the sale of diseased

fruit is planned by a number of

the leading horticulturists of the

county. A meeting was recently

held at which time the law re-

garding the sale of diseased fruit

was thoroughly discussed. County

Agent Cooney and County Horti-

cultural Parker are endeavoring

to enforce the law, and the

growers promised their strongest

support.

The Oregon law permits the

sale of any sound, clean and

wholesome fruit or vegetable, but

does not permit the sale of insect

fruit, such as has been offered

to the consumer in many parts of

the county. Mr. Cooney says, "The

county agent declares that retail-

ers should take great care to de-

termine the restrictions regarding

salable fruit, for otherwise in-

spectors are apt to condemn their

wares. Growers will also be pre-

hibited from offering for sale any

fruit below grade 4. Full in-

formation regarding fruit grades,

and the provisions of the law in

this regard, can be obtained from

the County Agent.
