SUTHERLIN INSITE AND ADDITIONAL VALLEY PROPERTY INVOLVED IN REALTY DEAL

Corporation Which Includes Two Roseburg Men Buys
Balfour, Guthrie Company Holdings and Individual
Lots Held by City as Initial Step in
Business Project.

Negotiations, which have been long pending, and which have caused much oral speculation and no small amount of excitement in the Sutherlin vicinity, have at last been completed with the organization of the Sutherlin Development Company, with headquarters in this city. This company, which has secured control of 240 lots, comprising the entire townsite of Sutherlin, except the individually owned lots and business property, is now being incorporated, and will start one of the biggest real estate enterprises in the Southern part of the state.

The company is made up of L. D. Jones, formerly of Roseburg, but more recently of Salem, W. R. Kirkpatrick, of Medford, and A. T. Lawrence, of Roseburg. This company has purchased the entire holdings of the Balfour, Guthrie Company, a part of which includes a large number of choice business sites, some fine lots on Central Avenue and State street, and in addition has secured other property in the Sutherlin valley by purchase and option.

The property has been purchased for speculation, the company having a conviction, based upon the facts of which they have knowledge, that Sutherlin is due for a great expansion in the near future. Plans have been made for several steps looking toward the improvement of the property and the valley in general.

Townsite Secured.
Of the property obtained by the company, 471 lots were purchased from the Balfour, Guthrie company. These lots are in the original townsite and include some of the choicest business and residential property in the city.

A large portion of the remaining land secured was acquired from the City of Sutherlin, being lots upon which liens were foreclosed. The City of Sutherlin held liens against several hundred lots and recently went into court and cleared title on all these pieces of property, so that the new company has been able to acquire a merchantable title to all of the land taken over. Some of this property is improved and very desirable.

Although the company holds 471 lots, all well situated, and in the event of a sudden boom in Sutherlin, extremely valuable, the members of the Sutherlin Development Company are well known throughout all of Southern Oregon.

Mr. Jones was engaged in the service station business in Roseburg for a number of years, having been the builder of the station now known as the Highway Service Station, at that time having been associated with H. W. Shaw. After disposing of his business interests here, he went to Medford and later to Salem, conducting very successful businesses in both places.

W. R. Kirkpatrick, of Medford, & one of the leading men of that city. He was associated with Mr. Jones in business there and also at Salem.

A. T. Lawrence, the third member of the firm, has been a Roseburg resident for a long period of years, being engaged in the real estate business for more than

seven years in this city. He is an active and industrious worker not only in business but in civic matters, in which he has always taken a great interest.

Company Incorporating.
The company is now incorporating with A. T. Lawrence, president, L. D. Jones, vice-president and W. R. Kirkpatrick, secretary and treasurer. Mr. Jones and Mr. Kirkpatrick are in Salem this week attending to the matter of getting the necessary corporation papers drawn up.

The principal place of business will be at Mr. Lawrence's office, 125 Cass street, in Roseburg and at the Sutherlin Hotel in Sutherlin. In addition the company will have representatives and offices in Salem, Eugene, Cottage Grove, Grants Pass, Medford and Ashland.

Future Anticipated.
The members of the company have made a considerable investment based entirely upon their faith in Sutherlin's future, together with certain facts of which they have obtained knowledge, which leads them to believe that the city is soon to have a greater area of expansion and development. There has been considerable activity regarding the timber east of Sutherlin, and there is a possibility that there will soon be a movement there, which will mean a great deal to the Sutherlin Valley.

Development Been Discouraged.
It has been known for several years that the Southern Pacific railroad company has discouraged timber development in Douglas county. The Southern Pacific railroad has been the only means of transportation for timber out of the county and the traffic over the line has been practically the full limit of capacity. In a short time the Naton cut-off will be completed. This will relieve the congestion on the main line to some extent, and will make possible local development of primary importance to the localities along the S. P. main line.

Timber companies which have heretofore been discouraged from developing their holdings, because of the lack of suitable transportation facilities will be able to move their timber to the market, and will doubtless take steps to open their timber areas soon.

Rumors of a railroad east of Sutherlin have been heard for several months, although nothing definite has yet been announced. It is certain, however, that eventually the rich timber area east of the city will be developed, which will have a decided effect in developing the entire community.

Many Other Resources.
In addition to timber the Sutherlin valley has many other resources, which sooner or later must be developed and which will bring prosperity. Drilling for oil is now in progress with very hopeful indications. The town is in the midst of a rich fruit industry, and likewise promises to be the mint center of the state.

Upon the development of these resources the new company is speculating, believing that the future holds such promises that a heavy investment is warranted. Maps and blue prints are now being prepared and will soon be ready for distribution. The lands will be listed with every real estate dealer in the state, who desires to handle them and will be placed upon the market in the immediate future. The lots are to be plainly marked with large signs, which are now being prepared and which will soon be erected on the property held by the company.

JANTZER SAWMILL AT STARVEGUT IS DESTROYED BY FIRE

The Wm. Jantzer sawmill at Starvegut, near Cow Creek Canyon, near Glendale, was destroyed by fire this morning, according to word received by the Douglas County Fire Patrol. The mill was a complete loss, with all its machinery and equipment. The fire started in the mill from some unknown source and wiped out all of the sheds, building and some piled lumber. Spread of the flames to the adjoining timber was halted through hard work on the part of the members of the crew and volunteer fire fighters. The plant had a daily capacity of about 10,000 board feet, and employed a crew of from 8 to 10 men. It was valued at about \$15,000. No insurance was carried.

REV. A. MCCLINTOCK DEAD AS RESULT OF A FALL SATURDAY

Aged Minister Passes Away
This Morning Following
Accident—Services
Wednesday.

Rev. A. McClintock, for more than 50 years a minister of the gospel and an active church worker, passed away at the Howell apartments, where he has been confined to his home practically all of the time. Saturday evening he lost his balance and fell against the door casing with such force that his hip was fractured. The shock of the accident was such that he recovered consciousness only at a few intervals and passed away this morning.

He was born, September 9, 1829 at Hamilton, Ontario, Canada. He attended Ypsilanti (Michigan) Normal and Chicago University. After teaching school in Iowa for a few years he began a lifetime of Christian service as a minister with the Methodist church. He was a circuit rider in the Upper Iowa Conference for years and filled pastorate in the upper Iowa, St. Louis, Missouri, and Northwest Iowa conferences, and supplied churches in the South Dakota Mission, Manitou Park church, Spokane, Wash., and Wilbur, Oregon.

He retired from the active ministry about 18 years ago, but has been frequently called upon as a supply pastor, and during the war accepted a call to Wilbur, Oregon. He was married at Slopertown, Scott County, Iowa, on February 1, 1866 to Nancy Jane Bell. They were the parents of seven children, six of whom, with the widow, survive. They are Effie M. (Mrs. J. C. Reinsner), Spokane; J. E. McClintock, Roseburg; Alva K. McClintock, West, California; Edith McClintock, Roseburg; Ethel R. (Mrs. O. M. Nicholas), Roseburg; and M. Stella (Mrs. L. L. Heywood), Quincy, Iowa.

Thirteen grandchildren and six great grandchildren also survive. Of the children all are present except Mrs. Heywood, who, because of the distance, is unable to come to Roseburg at this time. All of the children were together on February 1 of this year when Rev. and Mrs. McClintock celebrated their sixtieth wedding anniversary.

Full arrangements for the services have not yet been made other than that the funeral will be at the M. E. church probably on Wednesday, with Rev. Knotts officiating. Interment will take place in the Masonic cemetery.

GAINES CASE IS SEEMINGLY FAR FROM SOLUTION

Coroner and Sheriff Still
Working Independently
of Each Other.

FATHER MAIN FIGURE

Insists on Being Tried to
Dispel Suspicion That
Has Been Directed
Toward Him.

SEATTLE, June 28.—A coroner's jury that Friday began an investigation of the slaying of Sylvia Howard Gaines resumed sessions here today with her father, Wallace Cloyes Gaines, expected to take the stand.

Shirley Starwick, who for four days had vainly sought to have Gaines arrested as murderer of his daughter, expressed great interest in report of discovery of an automobile crank near an alder grove on Green Lake inside the city, where the body of Miss Gaines was found June 17.

Prosecutor Colvin, who Saturday refused to file a charge against Wallace Gaines, declared that nothing was disclosed in the Green Lake search which would cause him to change his stand.

Mrs. H. E. Maynard, of Lynnfield, Mass., mother of the slain girl, will not come here to take the body, the coroner's office said.

SEATTLE, June 28.—Crowds of Seattleites gathered in two widely separated portions of the city today to witness official investigations by a coroner's jury of the slaying of Sylvia Howard Gaines, held the almost undivided attention of residents here.

On every tongue is the question: "Who killed Sylvia Gaines?" One of the investigations was near where the body was discovered. It began at daybreak yesterday morning and continued until exhaustion overtook participants late in the afternoon. A diver from the city harbor department explored the shallow bottom of the lake and deputy sheriffs, directed by Sheriff Matt Starwick, worked with a drag. Among the articles brought to the surface were two considered by Starwick to be of significance. They were a small shoe-maker's hammer of the kind frequently found in automobile tool boxes, and half of a broken axle of a cart, with a heavy iron hub at one end. They were discovered on the lake bottom 100 feet from where Miss Gaines was found.

REGATTA COURSE POUCH
KEEPSIE, N. Y., June 28.—Porter regatta prevailed a half hour before the start of the freshmen race, first event of the intercollegiate regatta here today.

Long before the first race a throng estimated at more than 15,000 filled every vantage point along both shores of the Hudson and excursion steamers, war ships, palatial yachts and small craft thronged the east side of the river. In the boat houses along the west shore, the athletes rested before the battle, shaded from a scorching sun which made a hot tor of the course. There was scarcely a ripple on the broad expanse of the Hudson, which is more than a mile wide at the point.

These weather conditions, according to close observers, promised a victory for the giant crew from the University of Washington, but supporters of the navy were willing to concede an advantage to the westerners, while Wisconsin followers described the weather as "favorable."

"OLD IRONSIDES" ROARS AGAIN; ONE DEAD, FIVE INJURED

SALON, Santa Catalina Island, Calif., June 28.—An unidentified man was killed and five others injured, two seriously, in the explosion of a canon yesterday aboard the frigate "Constitution" while that craft was taking part in a battle scene off this coast in the filming of a screen play centered on the story "Old Ironsides."

The six men were on the rigging of the ship when the explosion occurred. The blast blew down two huge masts, hurling the men, many feet to the deck below.

MAJESTIC AND ANTLERS THEATRES ARE SOLD TODAY

F. F. Vincent, New Owner,
to Take Over Properties
First of Month—Mar-
sten to Stay Here.

An important business deal was consummated here today, when E. H. Marsten and sons disposed of their interests in the Antlers and Majestic Theatres to F. F. Vincent, a new arrival in Roseburg. The transfer to the new owner will occur on the first of July.

Mr. Vincent has had many years of diversified experience in the show game. He was connected for several years in the producing and booking business with Famous Players, has conducted several road shows, and has operated theatres in many large cities including New York. During recent years he has been engaged in the booking and district selling work and is able through this experience and his acquaintanceship with the large companies to secure early releases.

He promises that the majority of the large pictures in the future will be released in Roseburg before being shown in Portland, giving local theatre goers an opportunity to see the shows before they reach the metropolis.

Mr. Marsten, formerly of Portland, has been operating the two local theatres only a few weeks. He has managed the two popular places on a very satisfactory basis and has enjoyed the patronage and confidence of the theatre goers of the city. He is undetermined regarding his future plans, but expects to remain in Roseburg, at least for the summer. His sons will continue in their present capacities at the theatre having been retained by Mr. Vincent as assistant him in the operation of the two theatres.

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THRONG OF 7500 HEARS THE TALE OF EVANGELIST

Mrs. McPherson, in Temple
Pulpit, Sermonizes on
Her Experience.

GETS GREAT OVATION

Beauty Doctor Vanquishes
Evidence of Physical
Ills—Clew Given
to Kidnap.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

LOS ANGELES, June 28.—Before a densely massed congregation of 7,500 persons, Almee Semple McPherson spoke Sunday afternoon at her first regular service at Angelus Temple since her unusual disappearance at Ocean Park more than a month ago.

The subject of her sermon was "The Conquering Hosts," in which she painted a picture of her plight during her five weeks' absence, recounting how she was kidnaped and held captive in Mexico, and how she finally effected her escape.

Beauty Doctor Aids
Ten minutes before the service was opened by Mrs. Mianle Kennedy, the evangelist's mother, Mrs. McPherson made a dramatic entrance. At a signal, the entire assemblage rose from the seats and thundered a welcome. The ovation lasted for several minutes. The evangelist showed a marked change from her former fatigued appearance. She told the congregation that she had been in the hands of a beauty specialist so that she may "look like her old self."

Long before the start of the afternoon service, the approaches to the million dollar place of worship were jammed with automobiles and pedestrians. The pastor failed to appear at the morning program, but it was announced that she would deliver her first sermon during the afternoon.

7,500 Present
Hundreds brought their lunches and made a day of it and the day generally was one of the most extraordinary in the church history of Los Angeles.

Every effort was made to accommodate the immense throng. Before entering the temple Mrs. McPherson, seeing hundreds standing patiently in the sun, directed that room be made for them. Temple workers gave up their seats and 7,500 persons were crushed into a building designed to accommodate 5300.

Mysterious "Rose" Seen
A new angle to the religious leader's mysterious case developed when the evangelist announced she had learned that shortly before her disappearance two suspicious men and a woman were seen loitering about the Angelus Temple. The description of the woman was declared by the pastor to tally with that of "Rose," a member of the trio which Mrs. McPherson asserts kidnaped her.

Information regarding the suspicious characters was given the evangelist by Mrs. Bessie Hinkley Lacey, program arranger and radio hostess at the temple.

"The woman told me she had been a drug addict but had been saved by 'Sister' McPherson and wanted, as a means of expressing her appreciation, to sing over the radio," Mrs. Lacey said. "I took her name, address and for several days I saw her loitering about the church."

The information, the evangelist said, would be turned over immediately to the police and the district attorney's office.

GUARDSMEN TO SEE PADELFORD FIGHT JOHNSON TONIGHT

PORTLANDER KILLS WIFE WHO QUIT HIM, SON, THEN HIMSELF

LAKEPORT, Calif., June 28.—Lynn R. Laughlin, 29, janitor for a state institution in Portland, Ore., last night shot and killed his wife, Jeanette, his son, James, age 7, and himself, apparently after having failed to effect reconciliation with his family.

The shooting happened about midnight in the cottage of Mrs. Dorothy Skinner, where Mrs. Laughlin and her son were living. The bodies were not discovered until Austin Hendricks, a brother of the murdered woman, arrived at the cottage for breakfast this morning.

Mrs. Laughlin was found lying across a bed in her night clothes. The boy, who evidently had been shot while asleep, was in bed in another room. Laughlin, disrobed, was lying in a doorway of one of the bedrooms.

Mrs. Laughlin separated from her husband recently. Laughlin drove here in an automobile from the northern city, arriving on Saturday. He announced that he was going to attempt a reconciliation.

SPOTTERS PAID BY W. C. T. U. IN PENNSYLVANIA

Former Prosecutor for the
Organization Witness
at Senate Quiz.

TRAPPING PLAN TOLD

Refuses to Divulge Secret
Agent's Name—Method
Resulted in 270
Prosecutions.

WASHINGTON, June 28.—More information about the \$130,000 dry enforcement fund of the Pennsylvania Women's Christian Temperance Union was sought today by the senate campaign funds committee.

William B. Wright, deputy attorney general, whose home is in Baltimore, said he undertook dry law enforcement work in Pennsylvania in February, 1923, at the request of Governor Pinchot and that he received \$6,000 a year and expenses. This year Wright said, his salary was increased to \$8,000, but the only expenses allowed were for traveling, telephone and telegraph.

The witness said that up to August 1923, his salary was paid out of state appropriations, but that since it had come out of the W. C. T. U. fund.

Shielded Secret Agent.
"Who had charge under the governor of enforcing the prohibition law?" Chairman Reed asked.

"I suppose the attorney general, but practically it was enforced out of the fund."

"You had charge of legal enforcement?"

"Yes. Reed wanted the names of other employees, but Wright said he had one 'under cover' man, whose name he would disclose in executive session."

"This committee does not believe in government 'under cover,'" Reed said.

"I don't either," Wright replied. "This man was with me in the war and he goes around getting the facts as to where improvements in conditions should be made."

Spotter Methods Told.
The "under cover" was designated as "Mr. X." He joined up in August, 1923, at \$100 a month and expenses, including the purchase price of liquor he might find it necessary to buy. His salary was increased to \$250 the first of this year. He has been paid out of the W. C. T. U. fund.

"Mr. X went around where liquor was sold, and then passed on. Two other men followed and made a case," Wright said. Wright said there had been 270 such cases.

When Wright mentioned another under cover man, Senator Reed designated him as "Mr. Y." He got \$200 a month and expenses, all paid out of the W. C. T. U. fund. He had two assistants at \$150 a month each, the salaries coming out of "Mr. Y's" expense fund, but the witness withheld their names.

"I'll designate them as 'Mr. Z' and 'Mr. Zero,'" said Reed.

QUAKES SPREAD RUIN IN AGEAN SEA AND EGYPT

One Village on Island of
Rhodes Is Demolished,
Others Damaged.

LOSS OF LIFE SMALL

Volcanic Eruption Is Held
Responsible—Temblors
Also Shake Sumatra
and Singapore.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

ROME, June 28.—The village of Arkhangelo was wiped out and several other towns on the island of Rhodes were seriously damaged in Saturday's earthquake, which was felt throughout the Mediterranean basin between Asia Minor, southern Italy and northern Africa.

As far as is known only one person was killed. Several were injured. Greater loss of life was prevented by the flight of the panic-stricken population as soon as the first intimation of the approach of the dreaded earth tremor was felt.

The quake lasted only from 60 seconds to two minutes in various places and repeated itself three times. Even the upper stories of the houses were cleared of their inhabitants, however, before the walls began to crumble.

Buildings Toppled.
LONDON, June 28.—Meagre details were available today regarding casualties in a severe earthquake, or a series of quakes, which shook the Mediterranean countries Saturday evening.

In view of reports of the collapse of thousands of buildings, it would seem probable that casualties were numerous.

Advices from Rome are that more than 2,000 houses on the island of Rhodes on the Aegean sea, were razed and that the villages of Arkhangelo, Arinama, Apoloklin and Monilotho, suffered severely.

The center of the disturbance was in or near the Cyclades or Crete.

Volcano Believed Cause.
The shocks are thought possibly to have been due to the sudden activity of a volcano on the Greek island of Santorin. The archaeological museum at Candia, Crete, containing many antiquities, was wrecked.

At Athens, communications apparently were broken by the shocks.

The quake shook northern Egypt severely causing great alarm at Alexandria, Port Said, Cairo and Ismaelia. Some advices are that many buildings were thrown down while others had their walls cracked.

Few casualties have been reported from those places. There were several fatalities in the Egyptian countryside.

Four Villages Suffer.
Palestine, including Jerusalem, was shaken, but no damage or casualties have been recorded. According to late reports from Rome, 2,000 houses collapsed in four villages of the province of Foggia. Nothing was said in the dispatch.
