BOY SCOUTS MAKE TRIP TO TOPS OF HIGH MOUNTAINS

BOY SCOUT CAMP, THREE SISTERS, June 26.—(Special to the News-Review).—The Douglas and Coos county Boy Scouts left their summer camp at Frog Camp on Wednesday morning for Camp Mazama, on the Skyline trail. They left their packs there and then climbed the middle Sister, reaching the top at 11:30 a. m. From that high elevation they were able to see Mount Rainier in Washington, Mount Hood, Mount Jefferson, Mount Washington, Three Fingers, Jack, Squaw Mountain, North Sister, South Sister, The Husband, The Wife, The Little Brother, The Sphinx, Broken Top, Diamond Peak, Mount Thielen, Mount Bailey, Mount Pitt, Garfield Peak, Crater Lake Pitt, in Oregon and Mount Shasta in California, all of these mountains being snow peaks.

The boys ate lunch at the top and had a good nap, it being a warm day, and at 1:30 started down the slope. Some very thrilling snow slides were enjoyed, one slide of about 500 feet being negotiated in nothing flat. Two boys remained at Frog Camp as camp guards. Twenty-two attempted the climb and 19 reached the top, the downfall of the others being attributed to eating snow and drinking cold water.

That night eight scouts returned to Frog Camp and the two guards were relieved and joined the main group at Camp Mazama, where the night was spent.

At 3:30 the next morning all hands hit out and hiked breakfast and prepared a lunch and at 4:45 started for the top of the South Sister, which was reached by 15 out of the 16 who made the trip, the summit being reached at 10:45. They then went to the south edge of the Crater Lake and back, kicking through the snow found what they declare to be the finest drinking water in the world, running over the top of the mountain.

Lunch was eaten there and after a nap a trip around the lake was enjoyed, the lake being about 15 miles in size.

The snow at the lake is over a hundred feet deep, this being measured at a point where the wind cuts the snow away. The water at that point is of a very deep blue. The scouts were the first to register this year, marking their names in the little book left there by Mr. Britton in September 1921, being the only record of persons who have reached the top. Over 100 names could be seen from the top of the mountain.

The boys had some dandy slides going down and on reaching the bottom took a swim in a snow lake, then went back to Camp Mazama, where they ate a lunch of bread and water, bread being the only food remaining. Frog Camp was reached at 7:30, where a camp stew was waiting, also a good fire of mosquitoes.

Having failed to get the mountain scenery planned for the camp the scouts in the morning, to get away from the mosquitoes, and took a trip to Lost, or Ten-ton lake for a swim. This trip was spent in cleaning up and this afternoon a trip was taken to look over the lake and forest the long series of ridges lying over the ridges. After making their camp on Sunday and Monday the scouts will move on down to Blue River for fishing, merit badge work, and a hike to the old Lucky dog mine.

GOVERNOR URGES OFFICERS TO USE CAUTION IN ARRESTS

A warning to peace officers in connection with the use of firearms as an adjunct to making arrests, is being given by Governor Pierce in a letter sent out to all peace officers. Governor Pierce calls attention to the fact that officers have killed several men recently in making arrests, and although acknowledging that such a course of action sometimes becomes necessary, urges that a gun be used only in extreme cases. His letter is as follows:

To all peace officers in the state of Oregon:

I know full well that all peace officers in the state have been greatly aided by the boldness of lawbreakers, their refusal to submit to arrest and the general danger of the law manifested. Nevertheless, recent attempts to arrest law violators have resulted, unfortunately, in the killing of human beings, which is always to be deplored.

Section 1769, Oregon Laws, provides:

"If, after notice of intention to arrest the defendant, he either flees or forcibly resists, the officer may use all necessary and proper means to effect the arrest."

It has been held in the case of Lander vs. Miles, 3 Or. 36, that "killing a man upon a person, in order to secure life arrest, is justifiable only where it is necessary. It is not justifiable where the arrest can be secured by less dangerous means."

Your attention is also called to Sections 1906 and 1909, Oregon Laws, which contain the law governing when a public officer is justified in killing.

In the case of State vs. Doherty, 52 Or. 591, it was held: "A threatened self-defense, to warrant a homicide in self-defense, must involve imminent peril to life or limb; fear of a slight injury or a mere assault not felonious furnishing no excuse, but if, considering the relative age and strength of the parties or the ferocity of the attack, the intended beating is of such character as to endanger life or limb, it will be felonious, and the assaulted person may kill if necessary to preserve his own life or protect himself from such beating."

I therefore ask you, as peace officers of the state, to use extreme caution to see that the full intent of the law governing arrests, as interpreted by our courts, be carried out in spirit and fact. I am extremely anxious, as governor, to see every law enforced, including the Eighteenth Amendment, but it is always a source of regret when a life is taken by a peace officer. I therefore earnestly request the greatest caution be observed.

AMUNDSEN SAYS NO MORE ARCTIC DASHES FOR HIM

SEATTLE, June 28.—Sixteen men from our nation, who flew over the north pole from Spitzbergen, Norway, to Teller, Alaska, in the dirigible Norge, were being entertained in Seattle today. They arrived here yesterday from Nome, Alaska.

Captain Roald Amundsen, leader of the expedition, declared he was through with Arctic exploration. He has been to the south and north poles and through the north-west passage. It was declared probable by eight explorers who were included in the Norge crew that they would undertake another

polar trip, to determine whether there is land between the zenith of the world and Alaska. None was seen by the Amundsen expedition. The steering given by the explorers here was a noisy one. Crowds lined streets through which the party passed and cheered with-out reserve.
