U. S. WAR DEBT IS CONFRONTING NEW BRIAND MINISTRY

PARIS, June 29.—Parliament soon will be called upon to take the responsibility either of ratifying or rejecting the Washington debt funding agreement, says the declaration of policy of the new Briand cabinet, which was read before both houses this afternoon.

The government declares that settlement of the inter-allied debts is one of the factors upon which the proposed stabilization of the franc depends.

The text of that part of the declaration referring to the debt agreement reads:

The government knows that in order practically to accomplish stabilization of the franc, international aid will not be useless. But in no case will it consent to the slightest infringements upon the full sovereignty of the country.

It does not overlook the fact that the settlement of the inter-allied debts is one of the helps necessary to a sound reasonable stabilization. Consequently the urgent duty of the government is to put parliament in a position to decide this great question. It is already before both houses, and they will very soon have to take their responsibilities upon it.

The Chamber of Deputies today voted confidence in the new Briand government, giving it a full majority of 162.
