WIMBLEDON, England, June 29.—Threatening skies greeted the opening of today's matches in the Wimbledon lawn tennis tournament. Before play started it was announced that Suzanne Lenglen had cancelled all her tournament engagements, as the neuritis in her racket arm was still giving her great pain.

In the first women's singles matches today Mrs. Kitty McKane Godfree advanced by an easy victory over Miss C. Tyrrell at 6-2, 6-0.

HEROIC ATTEMPT TO SAVE WOUNDED BOY IS FAILURE

LA GRANDE, Ore., June 29.—Donald Johnson, 13, who was accidentally shot while hunting in the Snake River canyon a week ago Sunday, died at Enterprise yesterday, according to reports received here today. Burial will be held at Enterprise this afternoon.

Donald was brought from the hills by neighbors and his mother, the trip requiring two days of heroic labor over mountainous territory. For a while physicians said he had a chance to recover.

TAX COMMISSION WILL ASK LISTING OF INTANGIBLES

SALEM, Ore., June 29.—At the conclusion of the conference here yesterday of the state tax investigating committee, Attorney General Van Winkle was instructed to draft a tentative bill providing for the taxation of intangibles, the measure to become part of the program to be submitted by the committee to the 1927 legislature. It is proposed to tax intangibles at a low rate which has not yet been decided on. It is said that in other states the rate averages about 5 mills, the rate on intangibles being assessed according to actual value. Just what will be classed as intangibles has not been agreed upon, but the list is expected to include money, accounts, stocks not taxed in this state, bonds and mortgages.

POLICEMAN DIES OF BULLET FIRED BY CRAZED NEGRO

BALTIMORE, June 29.—Patrolman Webster Schuman died today from the effects of a bullet from a pistol of Vance Lee, 35-year-old crazed negro, who, armed with a rifle and two revolvers, brought down nine persons before he was slain by police bullets. Of Lee's remaining victims, Police Clerk Thomas Dillon, is expected to die. He is paralyzed from a bullet in his spine. Two others also were reported in a serious condition. The shooting started with a quarrel yesterday between Lee and Arthur Wells, another negro, whom Lee shot. He then procured a rifle and another revolver and started to terrorize the neighborhood. Five of those he shot were bystanders. He picked three of his victims from a police car which had been sent after him. Lee was once an inmate of the insane ward at the city hospital.

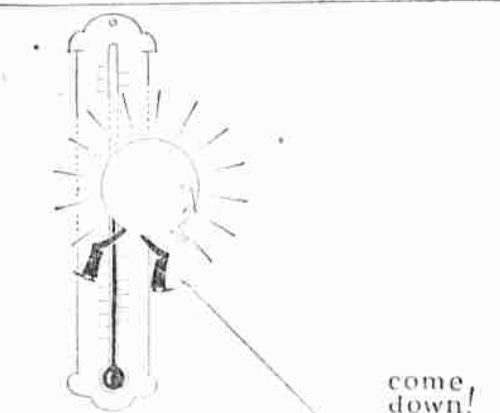
