PROPOSED LUMBER MERGER IN OREGON ATTRACTS BANKERS

PORTLAND, Ore., June 30.—Seeking information on the subject of merger of the larger producing companies in western Oregon and western Washington, J. D. Risling and Charles A. McCain, vice presidents of the National Park Bank of New York, are in Portland for a few days. While here they are conferring with bankers and lumbermen with a view to assisting in providing the required financial needs.

Some arrangement of grouping lumber producing companies as a means of regulating production to within consumptive demand, thereby stabilizing prices and turning losses into profits, has been under consideration for some months.

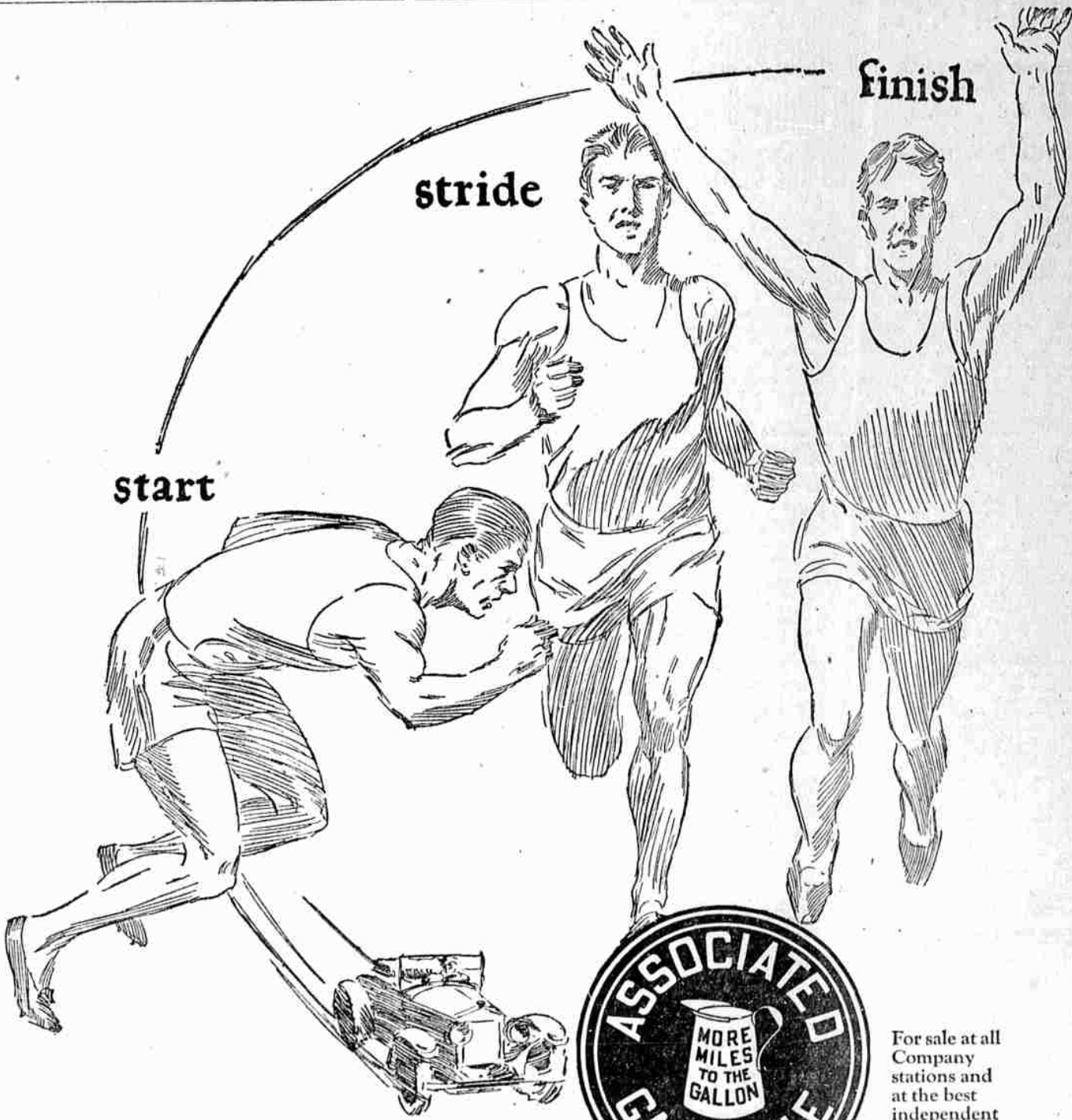
