Fine Fruit Tract Sold Within Short Time After Advertisement Appears—Retired Officer Buyer.

The results of advertising were proven again last night to the full satisfaction of the McLendon realty company.

Yesterday the company inserted a number of large display ads aggregating more than a page and a half in the News-Review. The entire company was kept busy until nearly midnight last night showing places advertised to interested persons. The 16-acre fruit tract in Edgewater, formerly belonging to J. SENATE PASSES GRANT LAND BILL

man; Guy Gordon, district attorney of Douglas County; H. N. Lawrie, of the Portland Chamber of Commerce; R. H. Mast, county judge of Coos County; Victor P. Moses, county judge of Benton County; H. L. Wetherill, of Medford; J. K. Weatherford of Albany and W. A. Went, assistant district attorney of Klamath County. This committee went back to Washington, D. C., and presented the case.

Senator Stanford, chairman of the public lands committee in the senate, and Congressman Sinnott, chairman of the public lands committee in the house, arranged immediate hearings.

Report unfavorable.

Previous to the arrival of the committee in Washington, Secretary Work had returned an unfavorable report on the Stanford bill. He granted a conference with the committee, however, and after listening to the history of the grants and the effect that the government policy had had, changed his views and latter issued a report stating that the government's policy of administering the lands had resulted in an actual hardship to the people, and that they were entitled to some sort of relief.

This placed the committee then in the position of offering the plan for the relief which the secretary said was necessary.

The house committee after hearing the statements of the committee brought in a favorable report on the bill which was prepared and introduced by Congressman Hawley.

Senate Report Favorable.

The senate committee likewise brought in a favorable report, putting the measure before both houses.

The lower house immediately called the bill up out of its turn and passed it with practically a unanimous vote.

An attempt was made to get it before the senate, but the effort failed. A second attempt made late yesterday was successful and

a favorable vote was obtained.

Now Up To Coolidge.

The measure is now up to President Coolidge for his approval. With the favorable action of both houses before him, especially in view of the fact that the action has been taken with little opposition, it is very probable that the president's signature will be attached.

The bill does not actually appropriate any amount from the treasury, merely calling for an advance until such time as the sale of the lands will pay off the existing obligations against the grant. When money comes in from sales, it shall be placed in the treasury to repay the government for such sums as it has expended, including the money to be advanced from year to year to the counties.

Pay Back Tax.

In the first place the government will pay the sum equivalent to the back taxes, which was amount to approximately five million dollars. The estimated amounts to be distributed are as follows:

Million And Half Coming.

The amounts given above are merely estimates. The amount actually due Douglas County, according to Assessor Calkin's figures, is \$1,485,174.71. In addition to this sum the government, if the bill is approved, will continue to pay each year about \$150,000, which will reduce taxes nearly 20 per cent. The tax reduction will probably be still further decreased in the event the county court is able to apply the sum received, governing the past 11 years, to paying off the bonded indebtedness, for that will eliminate the necessity of future annual levies for that purpose, so that in all, if the bonds can be paid with the funds received from the government, taxpayers of the county will obtain almost 25 per cent reductions in their taxes.

DR. HALL SHEDS LIGHT ON IOWA LIQUOR SPEECH

pleased with the statement in Chicago of Dr. Aaron B. Hall, president of the University, explaining his views on the prohibition question.

The Oregon anti-saloon league, the Portland ministerial association and the city region of America, had addressed statements to the board of regents requesting an investigation of Dr. Hall's address at Iowa City, June 29, in which he expressed doubt as to the wisdom of the eighteenth amendment.

"His own words clear up the entire matter of criticism," said Mrs. George T. Geringer, one of the regents.

R. L. Close, secretary of the Anti-Saloon league, however, insisted that Dr. Hall's statement was only partially satisfactory and that he saw his organization would not be satisfied with his views on local option.

Dr. Walter H. Nugent, pastor of the Central Presbyterian church, who presented the resolution to the ministerial association criticizing Dr. Hall's reported views on the eighteenth amendment, also expressed doubt as to the wisdom of favoring local option as a means of enforcing prohibition.

Had vision his rights.

EGGERS, ORE., July 2.—Eggene, in general, is not perturbed by the controversy over the speech of Dr. Hall on the prohibition situation, faculty members of the University of Oregon, to which institution Dr. Hall has been elected to represent, are of the opinion that Dr. Hall was well within his rights, and that criticism of his talk is, for the most part, rather in the nature of a political move.

James G. F. Skipworth and Fred Eick, both regents, declined to comment, but both set the impression that there was nothing to be disturbed about the far as the speech was concerned.

The Eugene Guard, in an editorial to be printed today, says, in part:

"Majority sentiment in Oregon favors prohibition unquestionably. It may be conceded even that majority sentiment here favors federal enforcement. But must a president of the University of Oregon hold and express only such views as accord a majority sentiment in order to qualify for his position? If it is answered that prohibition is a moral question and the president of our university should stand on the side of moral questions, the

obvious reply is that Dr. Hall is a firm believer in prohibition and therefore right from the standpoint of those who make that contention. The issue between Dr. Hall and his detractors is a question of method, not one of principle.

"Courage and strength of character are qualities greatly to be desired in our university president. It is to be hoped that Regent C. C. Colt is right in his quoted opinion that the board of regents will take no cognizance of the incident of Dr. Hall's remarks."

WOOL MARKET LULLS, BUT PRICES STEADY

BOSTON, July 2.—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say: "The demand for wool has slackened somewhat this week, following three weeks of fairly heavy business, during which prices have been moved up somewhat and by their advance have tended to halt business. The week closes with prices firm at the advance."

"The new clip is being rapidly cleared, especially in the far west. The foreign markets are firm, especially for fine wools, the last Australian sale of the season at Brisbane closing with prices well maintained."

"Mohair is steady."

ENROLLMENTS FOR SWIMMING CLASSES BE MADE AT ONCE

SENATOR NYE'S LEAD CLIMBS TO OVER 4 THOUSAND

Non-Partisan League Also Nominates Candidate For Governor by Over 8,000.

FAIRBO, N. D., July 2.—Senator Grand E. Nye, non-partisan incumbent, continued to pile up a substantial lead over L. B. Hanna, independent, for the Republican senatorial nomination early today as returns from Nye's rural precincts were tabulated.

Returns from 1,291 out of 2,167 precincts gave Nye 52,532, Hanna 48,325 in the regular term race. In the short term contest, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Senator Lead, Nye also led. The vote was Nye 32,761; Hanna 29,373.

Nye's campaign distinctly opposed the national administration, with attacks made particularly on the failure to pass the Kansas agriculture relief bill. The wild

assert and the Mellon bill were other subjects of attack.

Hanna, on the other hand, upheld the administration, winning the appellation "Coolidge candidate" within the state. He was campaign manager for Coolidge in the 1924 presidential election. Hanna represented the independent wing of the Republican party in the state—a faction opposed to the non-partisan league forces which have been incorporated in the non-partisan group of the party.

This non-partisan movement also renominated Governor A. C. Sorlie, in the gubernatorial contest. Sorlie had 59,099 votes while J. M. Haney, independent, had 48,555.
