Matter of Emotions

He has a direction of movement and purpose which he is able to control.

CONVICTS ARE STILL AT LARGE
(Continued from page 1.)

and so far no robberies have been reported, so it is a question where they would get money. The same holds true relative to the two who crossed the Wheatland ferry, which is a toll ferry. The North Bank conductor, however, declares the three men who rode his train were dressed in prison clothes.

Another report reaching here is that three rough looking men with sawed-off shotguns were seen in the woods near Beaverton, and that three deputy sheriffs and a state agent went from Portland to hunt them down.

SALEM, Ore., July 3.—Richard Moore and Walter Fisher, two of the four convicts who escaped from the state penitentiary yesterday by scaling a wall and cutting a barbed wire barricade that surmounted the wall, are believed to be hiding in Portland. The other two, Richard Franzene and Elliott Mitchell, are believed to be skulking in the brush in the environs of Salem.

Moore and Fisher are thought without doubt to have reached Portland in a commandeered truck last night. At least two men are believed to have been with them, according to their description, reached there after forebodingly taking several cars and intimidating motorists along the road. Apparently they reached the neighborhood of Oregon City in the car stolen here from Louis Lovre immediately after the escape. At Oregon City they employed a taxicab driver to take them to Portland, and when a short distance out of Oregon City bound and gagged the driver, left him in the road and took his car.

Near Gladstone on the east side road the car turned out a bearing. The two men then "stuck up" a man in a small car and took the car. This car ran out of gas near a service station. The two men left it and commandeered a truck in which they are said to have

driven to the edge of Portland, where the truck was abandoned. Motorists who were stopped by the two men said one of them was armed with a revolver. Warden Lillie is positive this was a dummy gun. He has received a tip that two dummy guns were about the prison yard and that only one of them remains.

The other convicts, Mitchell and Franzene, probably have not left the country near Salem, Lillie believes. There have been various reports of strange men seen and automobiles driving about in a mysterious way. All roads are carefully guarded and the men have not been sighted by any of the possemen.

Portland Officers Aid.
About 15 men under Deputy Warden Golden are on the trail of the convicts. These have been stationed in various places about the surrounding country. The Portland police department and the Multnomah county sheriff's office are carefully watching the roads and other important points in the country near Portland and similar cooperation is being given by officers in other counties in all directions from here.

The absence of the guards and officers who are on the man hunt has disrupted to some extent the industries at the prison. The time plant has been shut down and also flax operations outside the walls where the men were working under guard.

Three Guards Discharged.
Warden Lillie said that the three guards, W. W. Carson, R. F. Ochs and W. B. Cyrus, who are held responsible for the escape, have all been discharged. All three, however, have volunteered for the man hunt and are with the posse.

"Cyrus acknowledges blame," said the warden, "but the other two offer various alibis. But no alibis go."

Their places have been filled by a readjustment of shifts and so far no new men have been put on the payroll.

First Stolen Car Missing.
Possibly as many as six automobiles were commandeered by the fleeing convicts after they went over the wall. The Lovre car that was first taken on 24th street contained only about a gallon and a half of gasoline and could not have taken them to Oregon City. The car has not been found.

There is mystery about one other car and its driver. Indications are that the four convicts drove the Lovre car through the Salem business district to the river road leading north and that they divided near Hopmore. This assumption is based on the fact that a man named Carson saw two men heading north from Brooks at high speed in a high powered car. He had not yet heard of the escape, but so certain was he that the men were convicts that he telephoned to the Salem police and asked if any convicts had escaped. This car has not been reported as missing, and if it was a stolen car, the whereabouts of the owner is a mystery. It is thought Moore and Fisher were in this car, and that it took them about to Oregon City.

Two of Convicts Like Twins.
About the same time in the afternoon a smaller car was seen going south at a rapid rate, also from the Hopmore district, and it is believed this may have carried Mitchell and Franzene. Mitchell and Franzene are known among the convicts as "the twins." They are inseparable. They were fellow inmates of the Idaho industrial school and were sent to the Oregon prison for the same crime. Mitchell, according to information given Warden Lillie,

"If anything more than negligence and inattention to duty on the part of the guards was attached to the escape plot, then those guilty should be criminally prosecuted and properly punished," said Warden Lillie. "Common justice also demands that the guards be fully exonerated of the blame attached to them in the gossip and rumor that is flying around if they are innocent."

District Attorney Carson had not received Warden Lillie's request for an investigation early this afternoon, but announced that such a request would be given the full and prompt attention of his office and the matter laid before the grand jury, which is scheduled to reconvene here next Wednesday morning.
