FLOWER CULTURE.

Nearly all people admire flowers, but the majority of folks have not sufficient industry or interest to produce them themselves. Flower culture seemed to reach its height in many old fashioned country towns, where people had no very exciting amusements, and where the garden occupied time pleasantly. And yet people who go in for this ancient pursuit of flower culture find it grows more interesting the more they know about it. It becomes a kind of game to them to produce the very finest specimens of the particular flowers on which they specialize, and they may make considerable money out of it if they go in for prize winning and sale of their choice plants. A man who has gone in extensively for the culture of peonies, recently remarked that the development of these flowers was the principal event of the year for him. In his garden were thousands of these beautiful blooms, and to the casual observer they all looked alike. Yet he pointed out that out of his 200 plants, there were over 100 varieties, and he was constantly adding some new one. He showed the points of excellence for which he was striving in his effort to win prize awards, such as big size flowers, fineness of color, etc. Sturdiness of stem was a point which would never have occurred to a novice, but he showed how a plant which had very wonderful flowers might not have the elements of excellence, because its feeble stems had not so developed as to hold up these fine blooms, so that they flopped weakly over the ground. The flower growers of Roseburg give infinite pleasure to their neighbors, they make a more beautiful city, and they provide a resource for their own enjoyment that will fill many empty hours and calm the restless desire for some new sensation every minute.

One reason why in past years there was so much disturbance and serious mischief on July Fourth in many communities, was that the townspeople of such places took no interest in having a celebration of the better type. The tradition had been established that there were to be doings on that day to please the young people, and if nothing was arranged in the way of a pleasing public celebration, the younger element would have their own kind of a good time, which was commonly a lawless one. The birthday of the American nation is a big event, and if it is passed unnoticed, it suggests some lack of public spirit. The kid who is training to win the foot races is not apt to sit up all night exploding fireworks and menacing the town with his bonfires. And the good old custom of the Fourth of July oration should not be neglected. Some good speechifier is always willing to talk about this grand occasion.

When Miss Eleanor Sears of Boston recently walked the distance from Providence, Rhode Island, to Boston, which is 44 miles, in 11 hours, she set an example to those of her sex who take no pride in athletic achievement. Miss Sears' notable stunt suggests that the women of the future are not going to let themselves be so far outdone by men in physical ability. Having claimed equality of privilege with men, they are quite likely to set out to demonstrate that they have equality of strength, and are fit to compete with men in the world of business and industry. Every time a woman performs a feat like this showing physical endurance, she does something to encourage her sex to take up occupations that previously were considered closed to women on account of their inferior physical ability.

Otto Kahn, noted financier and patron of the arts, paid a wonderful tribute to the women of this country, in an address given before a club meeting in New York. He said the United States produces the finest type of womanhood in the world. If the women of America have developed into a superior type, it is because in this country they have been considered the equals of men. In the countries where they were restricted to an inferior position, they felt restricted to inferior tasks and pursuits, and have never developed all sides of their personality.

Assistant Secretary MacNider of the war department denounced pussyfooters in politics, people who do line to take a clear cut position, in a recent graduation address. It will be agreed that we have too many of these folks. When a man goes out for public service, he naturally wants to get elected, and there is a temptation for him to play politics to please special elements. But those who have gone on to high careers in politics never did that way. The people like to see some toes trodden on, and to hear the squealing that results.

The Oregon state penitentiary is again in the light, four convicts having scaled the wall to liberty. Strange to say, not a single guard got a glimpse of the fellows when they went "over the top." But, this is vacation period, anyway, and a lot of fellows take their recreation drawing down their snary and sticking to their job.

They would never have dreamed of our scientific achievement, and how modern technical skill would create self-propelled machines by which the average family could transport itself about the country at a high rate of speed, or that millions of letters would be carried across the continent monthly by mail services operating in the air. So now we look ahead and make glowing predictions of America's future, we probably have little idea of the triumphs that the next fifty to one hundred years will bring. They will be wonderful in the field of mechanical progress, and still more remarkable as respects social and educational conditions and human welfare. The people of those times will not doubt look back to our boasted civilization, and consider it a crude and meager form of development, and they will be thankful they were not here in these primitive times. The country is moving fast, and the people of Oregon have to be ready to adjust themselves to new ideas very frequently.

At the shooting Jordan fled but was caught by two chauffeurs. He made a complete confession, the police said.

GEORGE GARDINER OF PEEL HELD ON MASH COMPLAINT

Sheriff Starmer and Deputies Shambrook, Brannan and Dillard made an all-night trip in securing Gardiner's arrest, riding his outfit about 3 o'clock this morning, after having for more than two miles through the brush and over steep hills.

Gardiner's mash barrel, containing about 50 pounds of fermented mash almost ready for the "turn off," was found well placed in a tent located about two miles back from the road and in a very bushy location. Although an extended search was conducted the barrel could not be located.

Gardiner was arrested here several months ago charged with possession of liquor. He had the liquor in his car and was trailed by officers. A train halted him just as he was trying to cross the tracks, trapping him so that he could not escape the search which resulted in the finding of the booze.

Cut the nails straight across, and cut the large toe nail in a shape, the "V" pointing in.

prevents ingrowing nails, or if they have already started, it will keep them from getting worse, and it will, as an improvement, pull the ends of the nails out of the flesh. Scrape off as much dead cuticle growing down on the nails as you can, and clean under them, just as with your finger nails. Then take out the wet bits of cotton, and file or shave off the tops with a corn knife. Then paint them with collodion, which takes out the soreness. And that night, rub them with oil or cold cream, to keep the flesh soft.

If they have been bad, cut a horsehair shaped piece of felt and bind this over them and wear it for a day or so to keep the shoes from pressing against the sore spot.

G. Z. B.—You cannot dabble with ammonia and peroxide to discourage the fine growth of hair on your upper lip. There is nothing in an application that could destroy the roots of such hair without permanent injury to the tissues. The coarse or conspicuous hairs can be destroyed by having the electric needle used.

Toots.—Going without breakfast in order to reduce is not always right for your health, and a better way is to eat less of all fattening foods, such as sugar and starches. Brush your lashes to give them a gloss.

Hot Chicken Mold: This may be made with canned boned chicken or with left-overs of freshly cooked chicken. Begin by cooking one cup of soft white bread crumbs in one-half cup of sweet milk till a paste is formed. Add this paste to three cups of minced cooked or canned chicken, then stir in two tablespoons of melted butter, pepper to suit individual liking, one teaspoon of salt, one teaspoon of minced parsley, and one teaspoon of finely minced raw onion. Now separate three eggs, beating the yolks light and stirring these into the chicken mixture. Whip the egg whites still and fold them also into the mixture, then turn all into a greased mold. Set the mold in a pan of hot water and steam for one hour, or until done (about 350 degrees Fahrenheit) to bake till firm—about 45 minutes. Serve hot.

SHE GRATES WHEN SHE YAWNS.

C's knees and jaws grate when she opens her mouth to yawn. The parts are not stiff and do not pain, only the grating is annoying. Says she is not overweight and wants to know if it is possible the trouble might be due to not drinking enough water?

I never had noticed it before, but I have experienced it and I find that when I open my mouth wide and yawn, there is a sort of grating sound, and Ray finds the same thing. There's nothing the matter with our jaws! It is possible that your jaw grating may also be normal. C. However, there may be strange sounds in the head from nasal and throat catarrhs, and there may be grating sounds in the knees and other joints due to a low-grade inflammation with lack of sufficient lubricating fluid.

It may be possible that not drinking enough water is one of your offenses. It is a common one. It is possible that your diet is considerable even though you are not overweight. (Your statement that you are not overweight and that your father, whose troubles you told me of, is not overweight, made me smile, C., for I realized that I must give the impression that you were not overweight.)
