Corinne Griffith Introduces an Unusual Evening Cape Which Is Made of Graduated Ostrich Plumes.

There is always something new in the mode, and the spring months which show tendencies towards the exotic, have found a wrap which is distinctly in favor in Paris and in the smart places here. This wrap features ostrich feathers as an unusual trimming.

Corinne Griffith, in the First National film, "Mlle. Modiste," has selected an evening wrap that departs entirely from standard capes for evening, and appears in a wrap made entirely of ostrich plumes. The cape, with high upstanding collar, is flattered with its snowy feathers, and falls with exceeding grace in graduated plumes from white to grey and from grey to black at the hem of the cape. A train effect is achieved by the use of two elongated plumes in graduated color.

Wraps, just now, are attracting particular attention. The winter months, featuring luxurious furs have passed, and the midseason of velvet and brocade, lavishly fur trimmed, has been succeeded by the springtime of lamé and brocade silks, taffetas, chiffons and satins elaborately trimmed with fringes, feathers, embroidery, and pleatings and ruffles, which have come to dominate the mode.

The cape-wrap, which relies so much upon the manner in which it is worn, is exquisitely beautiful in brocades and lamés. There is the utmost of chic in its simplicity and the lack of detail in its trimming.

Lamés in gold, silver and colors are very smart and lend themselves to draping and are also smartly seen in coats which are brilliant with embroidered scarfs in which beads and rhinestones appear.

Chiffons and silks and taffetas are also worn in unusual fashions and frequently are lined in colorful velvets for additional warmth on cool nights.

In general, it is the unusual that triumphs in the evening wrap which appears nightly at the supper clubs and dances.

The Tea Room Looms Important

The mood for trailing chiffons has come to match the languor of the warm days of early summer. Colors, too, intrigue the mind needing restful tones after a vigorous winter of sports and social activities.

Consequently the tea-gown is a carefully selected part of the wardrobe that goes to seashore or mountains. And the lines of the new negligees and formal tea-gowns are particularly entrancing. There is a charm of movement and a suppleness of outline that makes them a fitting part of the restful hours between summertime activities.

Colors, and combinations of colors, are given especial attention. There is a harmony of detail which makes the summer tea-gown a thing of unusual beauty.

The new dyed laces, silver laces, laces, metallic fringes, beaded fringes and heavy silken fringes all form an important part of the detailed loveliness of the tea-gown.

Sleeves, in general, bear an important outline to the robe. They are most effective in their wrap-like beauty and often add to the wide lines by hanging tassels in brilliant beads or fringes to accentuate their width.

The neckline is always important in the negligee as its outline creates the becoming frame for the face. The straight line across the shoulders is an accepted line of beauty. A floral decoration at one shoulder, or falling loops of silk or velvet ribbons in vivid tones, in contrast to the pastel tints of the negligee is another effective treatment at the neck.

Girdles create a line of grace at the waist and frequently introduce a brilliant note in jeweled belt or rope of pearls.

Trains, too, are always alluring in the formal tea-gown and lend an air of grace in their trailing chiffon loveliness.

Anna Q. Nilsson, whose selection of clothes is always distinguished, wears a tea-gown of great beauty and becomingness in the First National film, "Miss Nobody." Miss Nilsson has selected a chiffon gown of simple, draped lines in which the wing sleeves and graceful train are features of beauty. A slip of silver lace peeps from the open front and matches in coloring the girdle of silver sequins. The gown is of petal pink chiffon in which bands of a rose tint are combined with beautiful results. The rose at the shoulder matches the two shades in harmonious detail.

LONDON, July 3.—One of the ladies of the royal family has started a new fashion for women's evening wear.

She appeared in the royal box at Covent Garden with a large rosette of rose-tinted tulle on her left shoulder instead of the ordinary posy of flowers.

Worn on the shoulder strap of her gown, the effect was striking and already many society women have ordered similar shoulder puffs for their evening gowns.

Recent revival of the Paisley or Spanish shawl for afternoon and evening wear has induced arbiters of women's fashion to look around for something fresh for the society dame.

They have gone back as far as Queen Anne's time for their idea and devised a shawl very similar to those worn in Queen Anne's days. It is a small affair triangular in shape made of bright colored crepe de chine with fringes at the side.

Another old world fashion has been revived to enliven the monotony of modern high and low waist lines.

This is the adoption of sashes for evening wear hung from the shoulder to waist and finished with a big loose bow.

Pleated sashes are very much in vogue, and mostly hang from the left shoulder to the right side of the waist line. Pleats also are being used in material for evening gowns but usually the pleated sash is worn over a simple frock of white or light colored material.

Favorite National Dishes

STOCKHOLM, July 3.—The most popular dish in Sweden is a yellow pea soup cooked with pork.

The peas are put into cold water the day before and well boiled several hours until quite tender and make a thick soup. A suitable portion of pork is cooked with the peas and is generally served cold with the hot soup. Along with the soup it is customary to offer hot arrae punch, rather sweet, especially in winter. After this dish as a rule thin pancakes follow.

This simple dish is typical of the Thursday dinner with all classes.
