RED CROSS TEACHES METHODS RESCUING DROWNING PERSONS.

There is no water in the lungs of a drowned person, according to the Red Cross life saving experts. People should get over the idea of rolling a person on a barrel to resuscitate him. The water does not go to the lungs. The same apparatus that keeps the food from entering the lungs keeps the water from doing so. One cannot successfully breathe and swallow at the same time. A drowned person is merely a suffocated one. His wind has been cut off by the enforced continuous swallowing of water, but the water is in the stomach, not the lungs, and any effort to remove water from the lungs, such as by rolling on a barrel, is a waste of time.

The best method to restore breathing is to press down on the patient's short ribs, then release them. The arms should be snapped down and back at a rate of about twelve to fifteen times a minute. This should be kept up until the patient begins to breathe normally. Every person should realize that his own two hands are the most effective instruments there are for restoring life to a suffocated person.

The prone pressure method of artificial respiration as a means resuscitating drowning persons has been endorsed by the American Red Cross and will be one of the things taught the life saving classes, which will be part of the Swim Week to be held in Roseburg from July 5th to 10th.
