PORTLAND, Ore., July 7.
Effective Thursday, morning local jobbers will advance the wholesale price of sugar 10 cents a sack, making the best cane \$6.25 and beet \$6.15. The advance follows a similar rise in the refinery list at San Francisco.

The market is firm and, according to local authorities, another advance of 10 cents or more is not far distant.
Consumers are still able to buy cheaper sugar than the wholesale list at cash and chain stores, with most of the grocers offering ten pounds for 65 cents.
