Ability Called For

The shot to Number 3 hole calls for some ability on the part of the golfer, for it is uphill from Number 2 and is situated on top of the point. A shot over the green allows the ball to roll down hill, while a short shot drops the ball in the canyon. A short green has been provided to give a safety shot for inexperienced golfers, while those with more ability have a chance to give their skill a real test.

Eventually the course will lead on from Number 3 hole, down a slope to the valley floor, southwest of Mt. Nebo, and up through a wooded country along a gentle slope to a plateau and then to the top of the ridge where Number 4 hole is now located. Number 4 hole is completed, but for the present only 5 holes are being provided.

Number 4 is the short hole or the course, the two being located on high ground which affords a wonderful panoramic view of the city of Roseburg. A shot over two squatty oaks makes a delightful mashie hazard for the skilled golfer, while the less experienced player can "dogleg" to the given in safety.

Long Shot Afforded

Number 5 hole, which will be Number 9 when the course is finished affords the real thrill. From a lofty height the golfer may drive back to the finish, a distance of 500 yards.

The course has some very unusual features. In spite of the fact that much of the playing is on high ground there is very little climbing to be done. The greens are approached by gentle slopes, while the down hill trails will be

Whether they are justly blamed and whether they are guilty of the crime should be determined by the jury. The investigation is being made at the request of Warden Little.

NON-STOP FLIGHT ENDEAVOR PROVES FIZZLE AT START

(Associated Press United Wire.)

PORT ANGELES, Wash., July 7.—The navy seaplane PB-1, which hopped off today from Seattle intending to try for a non-stop flight of 1200 miles to San Diego, Calif., was forced to descend at Point Barrow, 29 miles west of here, on the Strait of Juan de Fuca. The plane is being towed here by a coast guard patrol boat.

SEATTLE, July 7.—Bound for San Diego, 1200 miles away, without stop, the PB-1, a navy seaplane, hopped off from Sand Point aviation field this morning. The PB-1 is to be attached to an air squadron based at San Diego. The flight is estimated at 16 hours.

Her crew includes Lieutenant Ralph E. Davidson, Lieutenant Rico Botta, Mechanic George Galley and H. A. Scott, radio operator. Lieutenant Commander Eric L. Barr, stationed here to start a naval reserve officers training corps at the University of Washington is a passenger.

Destroyers have been stationed on the coast, at Cape Mearns, Cape Blanco, Cape Mendocino, Point Sur and Cape Conception to aid the plane should she become disabled.

The PB-1 can carry a useful load of seven tons, has a wing span of 87 feet and is 57 feet long.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., July 7.—The army air service has done much of the inventing work on the five-mile high camera, which will be used soon to experiment with long range aerial photography from immense heights near Dayton, Ohio. The big lens, and the film which will absorb impressions not hitherto susceptible in such work were made by the Eastman Kodak company, but the remainder of the design was the work of the air service under direction of Dr. S. M. Burke, of McCook Field. The flight will be made by Lieutenant G. W. Goddard.
