COOLIDGE'S CAMP ASSUMES TRAIT OF OCCUPANT—QUIET

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PAUL SMITH'S, N. Y., July 8.—Silence continued to envelope White Pine camp today with guards holding all visitors far from the buildings housing the president. A pike caught by the president was the first thrill of vacation experienced by the president since his arrival at White Pine.

The executive offices began operation today. Secretary Sanders taking up his duties there. Mail was received by pouch from the White House and was forwarded to the president at the camp.

Press clippings and newspapers were also sent to the camp, that the president might keep fully informed of events in the outside world.

Later it was learned that the president took a walk in the rain about the camp, and then went indoors to spend the rest of the morning in going over mail and newspapers.

VALUELESS NORTH PORTLAND WATER FRONT FIRE SWEEP

PORTLAND, Ore., July 8.—A tremendous fire that threatened for a time to sweep the entire North Portland water front destroyed the old abandoned plant of the North Pacific Lumber mills early this morning. At one time it was estimated there were more than 100 acres of buildings in flames and thousands of people collected to view the blaze.

Practically all the west side fire apparatus and two fire boats answered the call.

Fighters directed their efforts towards saving nearby buildings. Flaming sparks were carried for blocks and crews of workmen labored to wet down sheds many blocks removed.

Flames were visible a distance of 25 miles from Portland and residents of Trouton district stated a newspaper could be read by the light.

Passenger traffic on the Great Northern and S. P. and S. was tied up for several hours.

The loss was nominal as the plant had been dismantled and all available equipment removed.

TRAGEDIES TAKE TOLL OF LIVES IN OREGON, TWO DAYS

PORTLAND, Ore., July 8.—Five deaths, four in Oregon and one just across the northern California line, occurred yesterday and Tuesday as the result of accidents.

Asa Sanders, 17, high school student, was killed when he came in contact with a high tension power line while repairing a telephone line at his home in Medford. Lee Watkins, 78, night watchman for a Hill, Calif., saw mill lost his life when he walked against a wire carrying 4,000 volts.

Nell Robinson, 25, Hood River, died here of injuries received in an automobile accident.

Fred Daugherty was fatally injured near Oregon City when a binding pole of a load of hay broke, the sharp end piercing his body as he fell to the ground. John Custer, 68, was killed when he fell from a load of hay near Lebanon. He was believed to have struck his head on a stump.

ROCKEFELLER, SR., ENJOYS GOLF GAME ON 87TH BIRTHDAY

POCANTICO HILLS, N. Y., July 8.—John D. Rockefeller observed his 87th birthday today with his usual round of work and a game of golf. Friends and family shared in the quiet observance of the anniversary.

Many letters and telegrams of congratulations were received from widely scattered points on the globe.

"I am thankful every day of the contentment I enjoy in living a quiet and simple life," said the oil magnate, when asked for an expression of his sentiments, "and I am grateful for the many beautiful messages of good will I am continually receiving from every quarter. Since it is impossible to answer all of these, I take this opportunity to express my thanks to these many friends."

AUTO WRECK FATAL TO PORTLAND LADY
