DODGE SEDAN IS EASILY CHANGED TO SLEEPING CAR

"Take your hotel with you in a Dodge Brothers sedan." A bed for two persons can be made by slight changes in the regular equipment of Dodge Brothers sedans by any service station. A practical dressing room is made by blocking the extra wide doors open with a stick across the top from which a curtain is suspended. Ventilation may be regulated to suit any person.

Detailed information from a drawing of how to convert a sedan into a bedroom may be obtained from J. O. Newland and Son, local Dodge Brothers dealers. The little work of low cost entailed will return many times in money saved for hotel bills and in comfort while travelling or camping. When the bed is laid on the cushions on the floor of the sedan, there is plenty of room for two persons, and plenty of ventilation may be had from any direction. In extremely cold weather the car can be closed up entirely. One of the two arrangements suggested requires only the change from the regular equipment by the use of a loose hinge-pin in the front seat frame hinge. The steps in changing follow:

Step 1—To make up the bed the hinge-pin is removed and the back of the front seat is laid where the rear cushion rests, with the bottom of the front seat frame leaning against the rear seat back cushion.

Step 2—The rear seat cushion is placed in the tunnel with its deep front edge against the top of the front seat back cushion. Step 3—The front seat cushion is turned around so the deep front edge is next to the back edge of the rear seat cushion.

Due to their extra large width, only three cushions are needed for the ordinary person. If necessary, however, an apron can be arranged to hook under the instrument board and strap back of the front seat cushion, to support the feet. A comfortable bed is formed, when the front seat frame is filled in with pillows or duffle. "The adaptability of the closed car for economical traveling appeals to many people who like to make camping trips," said J. O. Newland. "Until a few persons had tried out the plan and more had learned of it, I had no idea the feature would become so popular. We will be glad to help anyone with a Dodge Brothers sedan who may want to convert his car into a sleeping compartment for traveling."

Spring, Oregon, are stranded in Portland with their ponies and round up trappings seeking a means of transportation back to the reservation. The Indians lay their plight to the asserted failure of the manager of the Oak Grove Amusement Park, where they put on a round-up July 2, 3 and 4, to pay them the full amount of \$3,000 they say they were promised.

Chief Kuckup, head of the tribe, declared they received only \$550, which was spent before they could get back to the reservation. They would have gone hungry, he declared, had it not been for the generosity of C. C. Schlessor, manager of a fertilizer plant, who donated them a steer.

Officials of the Better Business Bureau, to whom Chief Kuckup appealed, are investigating the details surrounding the Indians' claim.
