REV. SPENCER TO TRANSFER TO POST IN MIDDLE WEST

PORTLAND, July 10. — The Rev. J. C. Spencer, pastor of Central Methodist church, and the Rev. Frank David Lawyer of Ogden Park Methodist church, of Eugene, will exchange pastorate about September 1, according to an announcement made today by Dr. A. L. Howarth, superintendent of Portland Methodism. The change is said to have been made at the request of the Portland pastor, who for some time has wanted to return to his old conference in the Middle West.

The Rev. Mr. Spencer came to Oregon in 1911 from the Rock River, Illinois, conference and

since that time has served Marquam, Silverton, Salem, Leslie church, Roseburg, Albany and Rose City Park and the Central churches in Portland.

Dr. Howarth said he regretted the loss of the Rev. Mr. Spencer, and that he prized him highly as a pastor.

HOMESEEKING SALMON CRASH HATCHERY GATE

PORTLAND, Ore., July 10. — Crashing and splashing their way 300 yards around and over stones, through hardly enough water to wet their gills, in order to reach the ponds where they had their first glimpse of life, 150 big salmon are peacefully cruising about the quiet ponds at the Bonneville fish hatchery today, branding as clumsy the idea that fish do not know the way home.

In their battle to get back, they crashed the gates of the lower ponds and liberated about one million salmon fry. These latter fish were about ready to be turned loose anyway, according to the fish commission.

The home seekers are spring salmon weighing from 14 to 30 pounds. It is not unusual for them to return to the hatchery, but this is the first time they have ever crashed the gate.

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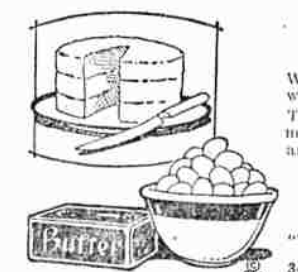

DOUGLAS COUNTY CREAMERY WILL BE INCORPORATED

New \$100,000 Firm to Be
Established and Plant Is
to Be Extended and New
Structure Built.

The Douglas County Creamery today announced that due to the great expansion of business during the past few years and the demand for additional lines in this county that a corporation is being formed with a capital stock of \$100,000. During the past few years the Douglas County Creamery has grown in size from a small plant handling only cream and butter to a well established business with a reputation for dairy products and ice cream over the entire coast. It is now proposed to launch into additional fields besides increasing the present lines. It is planned at an early date to construct a 2-story building on the lot immediately adjoining the present structure on the west, to give room for the expansion of the creamery, which is now over crowded, and also to provide space for the new lines of business.

The officers who will remain the same as at present, announce that dairymen and dealers who have been connected with the creamery in trade relations in the past, will have an opportunity to buy stock if they desire, but no stock selling campaign is to be made and no one is to be urged to buy stock. It is to be made practically a cooperative concern if the dairymen and dealers desire to purchase stock, but no urge is to be made upon them. Papers to complete the corporation are now being prepared by the company's attorneys, George J. Willett and Ray B. Compton.

THE GIST OF THE BIBLE

BOOK BY BOOK

EZEKIEL, THE EXILE PROPHET OF HOPE

As Isaiah is the statesman prophet of faith and Jeremiah the martyr prophet of love, Ezekiel is the exile prophet of hope. The scene of his entire ministry was in the Babylonian Empire where he was carried with the second group of captives eleven years before the captivity was made complete in the destruction of Jerusalem.

The first twenty-four chapters of Ezekiel recount his call and prophecies during these eleven years, in which he sought in vain by his numerous parables and impersonations to convince his fellow-exiles of the coming destruction of Jerusalem and the righteousness of God's judgment in destroying it.

The paganism of his miniature siege of Jerusalem represented in the tale bearing the picture of the doomed city; the shaving of the prophet's hair and beard and the burning and cutting and casting to the winds of the three parts of the hair, symbolizing the fate of the inhabitants of the city; the prophet's enactment of the part of the fleeing exile escaping from the hole in the wall with his few personal effects; and his bereavement at the sudden death of his wife at which he was commanded not to mourn are but a few of the incidents of the prophet's ministry which make this book one of the richest in imagery in the divine library.

Everywhere, as he pronounces the doom and destruction of Jerusalem and pictures the horror of it all, the prophet vindicates to justice of God in the punishment of the people for their gross sins of idolatry and impurity, and repeatedly affirms the purpose of God, that by punishment the suffering people may learn to know him and come to repent and be saved. For no phrase occurs more often in the book than the words, "And ye shall know that I am Jehovah."

But all of this ministry of Ezekiel fell upon deaf ears. The exiles refused to believe that Jerusalem would fall until one of the refugees came with the sad news, "The city is smitten."

In the meantime the prophet pronounced the doom of the seven surrounding nations which had oppressed God's people, repeatedly indicating the purpose of this judgment also in his most familiar phrase, "They shall know that I am Jehovah." (Chapters 25 to 32).

After the news of the destruction of Jerusalem reached the exiles Ezekiel's ministry met with a more favorable reception, and from Chapter 33 to the end we have this great gospel of hope in which he prophesies the restoration of God's ancient people to all their former glory.

The nation which is as a valley of dry bones shall live again; the ancient temple is seen restored and filled with the glory of the Lord which the prophet, in his earlier visions, had seen depart from it. The altar and its offerings are restored and the prophet sees a great river of the water of life proceeding from the temple to bless the whole world.

He closes the book with a picture of the same heavenly city described by St. John in the Revelation and names the city "The Lord Is There."

How wonderful, that this clear vision of gospel hope which is fulfilled only in Jesus Christ, the "Prince" of Ezekiel's prophet, should have come forth from the darkest hour of Israel's national history, the Babylonian captivity!

Truly, "Night brings out stars as sorrows show us truth."

No change was made in butter and egg quotation on the local dairy board at the close of the week but the markets are far from steady. Butter especially is weak and in liberal supply with a decline in price pending. Eggs closed fairly steady with a good demand for fancy, fresh stock.
Country dressed meats closed firm and fractionally higher; demand is strong for choice light veal and hogs with top calves moving readily at 17¢ and top hogs at 20¢.
Recent business in wool has been at steady prices with country holdings further reduced. Around 500,000 pounds have been purchased by E. J. Burke in the Baker and Echo districts during the last few days. While prices were not announced they were understood to be well in line with current values. Unsold stocks around Heppner have been reduced to 300,000 pounds with approximately the same amount at Baker and about 100,000 pounds around Echo.
