LASKEY PREDICTS THE COMING OF A MOVIE SHAKESPEARE

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., July 8.—The screen is ready for its Shakespeare and the film will have its "Bard of Hollywood," as Shirley of Avon.

This is the pronouncement of Jesse L. Laskey, motion picture producer. And while he does not forecast the arrival of the super-herald this year or next, he declares the great need of motion pictures eventually will bring its answer—a screen Shakespeare.

"A man will come who will tower above past writers and contemporaries in the construction of original screen stories," Laskey declared. "He will bring to the screen something new, some great thought, some finely wrought form of construction and story telling. He will open our eyes to new possibilities, to new dreams of the screen as a medium of art, and when he comes he will leave a creative monument behind him that many generations will gaze upon."

Arrival Not Far Away.

"There is a tremendous need and I, for one, am sure that the super-herald of pictures will rise in the not too distant future."

"The screen started from hickling thirty years ago and today has developed a marvelous medium of pictorial story telling. It is an artistic medium that has grown faster in its technical possibilities than it has in its literary and dramatic power."

"We have some trained writers who think in terms of the screen, who dream their dreams in terms of picture art. We have trained technical writers, but most of them have come to us from the world of letters or from the short-story or newspaper field. We need those who can write who need men and women who are thinking in terms of Olympus."

Will Use Old Material.

"We need someone who will bring to the screen what Shakespeare brought to the drama of his time. He galvanized dramatic construction and gave it form. He pulled the dream out of its rut of tradition and its heritage of being a religious spectacle."

"We do not expect someone to come along with startling new plots, novel situations, or brilliant photographic effects. Shakespeare, as a matter of fact, worked with old material. Many of his plots were time worn, and had been used by many other writers in many countries. But it was what Shakespeare saw in them and what he saw in the stage as a medium of expression that made him great."

Poisonous Root Made Available for Food

Fariha, a bread made from a poisonous root, the mandiocca, is the staff of life of the wild Indians of interior Brazil and also of the Indians. The mandiocca root, which resembles sweetpotato, the parsnip, is poisonous, but the natives know how to pull its "fangs." Each Indian family in the Amazon basin has a section of tree trunk made slightly concave on one side. This shallow trough is studded with pieces of flat or with large fish teeth set in the pitch-surfaced board. The women shred the mandiocca root on this primitive grater, and pack the white dust resulting in long woven mat tubes. After soaking the tubes in the water the contents are suspended from a tree limb to drain and pressure is applied to them on the principle of the tourniquet. This operation, which washes out the poison, must be repeated several times before the fariha can be used as a coarse flour for bread. For convenience in transportation the fariha is made into cakes a half-inch thick and a foot in diameter. It requires strong teeth to bite a piece out of one of them and eat it, according to white men who have tried it. The food is wholesome and nutritious, but rather tasteless.

Riding a Camel

The geographers do right to call the camel the "ship of the desert." It is, indeed, like a ship that pitches, tosses and rolls, all at the same time, in a storm.

A little skeleton "hovetab" is put on his back while his master leads him by a long rope. The unfortunate passenger sits cross-legged on top of the camel's very bony backbone and endeavors to adapt himself to the rolling, pitching movement. It makes many persons seasick.

The camel has a mean disposition, and is always trying to quarrel with the other camels in the party, biting and kicking them, grunting and making a general nuisance of himself.

World Is "Thin Shell"

"It is wholesome for proud man to look upward on a bright day at some pretty cloud, to consider that it is composed of ice crystals, that it floats in arctic cold, that it signifies to us what hothouse creatures we are. If the roof of air were removed we should all be frozen to death in a moment. Just above the roof is deadly cold, and just below the crust of earth is deadly heat. Only within the thin shell that separates these two regions can the human race strut about and congratulate itself on its great powers."—Henshaw Ward, in "The Wildspots of the Weather," in Harper's Magazine.

Belief in Toad Stone

W. J. Rolfe in his notes on "As You Like It," says: "Better nature-ists than Shakespeare believed in the toad stone, the 'precious jewel' of the text. Pooton in his 'Secrets Wonders of Nature' (1590) says that 'there is founde in the heades of old and great toades, a stone which they call borax or stelen; it is most commonly founde in the head of a hee toade, of power to repulse poisons and that it is a most sovereigne medicine for that stone.' Allusions to it are frequent in the literature of that day."
