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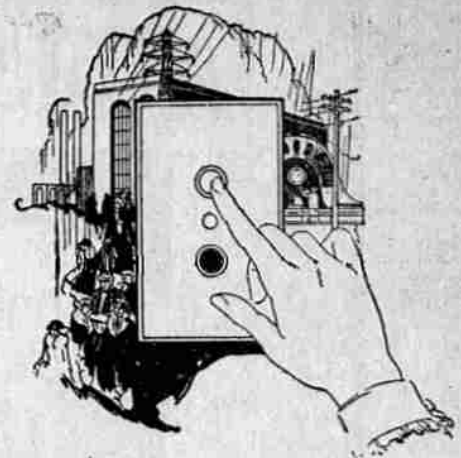

GUESS WORK REMOVED FROM MOLDING SANDS
ITHACA, N. Y., July 12.—Science has taken the guess work out

of another industrial process. It has evolved standard methods for testing molding sands which enable the foundryman to tell whether the sand he is using, for a given casting has the right properties for preventing flaws, whether it is strong enough and whether it contains the proper venting qualities.

Worked At Cornell.
The standardization, which already is effecting substantial savings in the industry, has been perfected by an international research committee organized by the American Foundrymen's Association and the National Research Council. Much of the research work that attended the development of the standard tests has been done in the laboratory of geology at Cornell University.

As a result, the committee has recommended several pieces of apparatus for testing the strength, permeability and texture of molding sands. Previously the foundryman had had no accurate means of determining whether he was using the sand that exactly met his requirements and consequently many castings were spoiled due to experimentation with various grades.

Now, however, he can test his sand before he starts a casting, thus often eliminating the possibility of costly mistakes. With the same methods he can maintain a daily control over the properties of his sand heaps.

One of the factors leading to the organization of the research committee was the gradual depletion of the deposits of high grade molding sand and the increased costs of shipments from new and less accessible beds. The annual sand bill of the American foundrymen, it was estimated, had soared to \$8,000,000, and so scientists were asked to find a means of preventing waste.

Can you imagine what would happen if we strike oil in Sutherlin Valley?
