

MRS. McPHERSON'S EX-RADIO AGENT IS BEING SOUGHT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
LOS ANGELES, July 12.—Three grand jury subpoenas issued for Kenneth G. Ormiston, former radio operator at Angulus Temple, remained unserved today.

The search for Ormiston, which was renewed last week following Almee Temple McPherson's appearance before the grand jury to tell the story of her alleged kidnapping, has failed thus far to produce more than clues as to his whereabouts.

Just what trend the radio operator's testimony is expected to take if he finally is summoned before the inquisitorial body has not been fully indicated by the district attorney's office. Those following the case have placed an unexpected significance in the fact that while no great effort was being made to locate Ormiston, the search was renewed with vigor immediately following the appearance of Mrs. McPherson as a grand jury witness.

Employees at a Riverside Hotel last night identified photographs of Ormiston as those of a man who inquired twice at the hotel within the last ten days for Mrs. McPherson. He was described as having asked on each occasion whether the evangelist had "registered yet." Officers who went Saturday to Riverside and later to San Diego in search of the radio man, returned last night admitting that they had run down all clues in this section.

PHYSICIANS OF COUNTY WILL MEET WEDNESDAY NIGHT

Physicians of Douglas county will hold a meeting at the Elks Temple at 8 p. m. Wednesday. The meeting is to be addressed by Dr. Frederick Stricker, of the state board of health, Dr. W. B. Morris, of Salem, president of the state medical society, and Mr. Foley, secretary of the Oregon Public Health League. Dr. Stricker will speak on the subject of periodic health examination, one of the main purposes of the meeting. A national campaign for periodic check-ups and organizations are giving the fullest cooperation to this important matter. Mr. Morris will explain the aims and organization of the state medical society, while Mr. Foley will speak on matters relating to the work of the health league. BUILDING PROJECTS AT KLAMATH FALLS INVOLVE \$625,000

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 12.—Application for a building permit for \$325,000, covering construction of a terminal building here, was made Saturday by the Southern Pacific. The permit does not cover construction of truckage or cost of changes in land contours, expected to bring the total to approximately one million dollars, according to estimates of Southern Pacific engineers.

Headed by R. A. Fraser of Portland, a group of Klamath City capitalists today completed purchase of a building site in the center of town, at the corner of Seventh and Pine, and will immediately commence construction of a seven-story hotel to cost \$200,000.

The site was purchased from the Bellman estate. The building will be 102x195.

AVIATORS ON LAST LEG OF ROUND-THE-WORLD TRIP.
