Sheep and goat raisers of Douglas County do not need to be convinced regarding the value of purebred stock to head their flocks. The only question in the minds of breeders is who has the best blood for the money.

In times past this county supported each year a large number of breeding sales. This sale policy is now being reflected in more sheep and goats of quality than ever before.

Many flock owners are breeding as good individuals as can be found in the state. In point of fact several prominent sheep

breeders of the state have made and established on these breeding flocks of the best blood. These flock-masters know that and rams and breeding females can be developed within the county at values comparing favorably with any section of the state.

Breeding rams and billies are now to be had at reasonable prices from these breeders. Several years ago the first county agent of the county established an annual event known as Douglas County Buck and Billy Sale. This sale assisted in the greater distribution of purebred stock than was possible before. The sale soon became an annual event in the years to follow.

The seventh annual sale of purebred rams and billies will take place at Oakland, on July 31.

Any county breeder can consign any number he wishes. Owners must at all times have charge of their own animals and assume the natural risk of accidents attendant at any sale where animals must be transported from point to point.

Lewis P. Terhune, of Albany, died yesterday at Mercy Hospital after six weeks of critical illness. Mr. Terhune came to Roseburg six weeks ago to visit with relatives over the week end. On the way he was stricken with acute appendicitis and was removed at once to Mercy Hospital. His case was found to be most critical, five abscesses having developed by the time the operation could be performed. No hope was held forth for his recovery, but

in spite of his serious illness he showed signs of improvement until Sunday, when the strain affected his heart in such a manner that a new complication developed causing death.

Mr. Terhune was born at Heppner and resided in Albany from the time he was 5 years of age. He was 46 years of age at his death.

He is survived by a widow and five children. Funeral services will be held at Albany on Wednesday.
