BAKER, Ore., July 13.—Spanish war veterans in state convention here today unanimously went on record for construction of a \$50,000 statue in honor of Theodore Roosevelt at Battle Rock, Port Orford, on the Roosevelt highway.

Several hundred dollars were pledged today.

REEDSFORT, Ore., July 12.—The capture of a blue shark is reported by Wilcat Pete, owner of the Empqua river, a hard struggle was put up by the shark before it was subdued. The shark was caught off-shore between the Winchester Bay bar and the Sunday bar while fishing for salmon. A trailing line was in use when the shark bit over a small salmon that had been hooked.

The estimated length of the shark was 11½ feet and the weight 250 pounds.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 13.—A parouse belonging to one of the squaws of the Warm Springs Indian band stranded at a local amusement park, died Sunday of starvation, it is now known here today.

The Indians had complained of lack of food following a performance at the park for which they charged they had not received the pay agreed upon.

The mother of the dead child was to the Warm Springs band, operating with another of the Indians to try the baby.

The remainder of the Indian play to move Wednesday to another park, where they are to give a performance before leaving for their homes.

CONTRACT IS LET FOR CONSTRUCTION BARKER BUILDING

The contract for the construction of the new Barker building was let yesterday evening to John Barker, who is preparing to start work this week on the new structure. The building has been in contemplation for some time, and will be a decided improvement on Main street.

It is to be of reinforced concrete, one story in height with stucco finish and will be 80 by 111 feet in size, fronting 80 feet on Main street and 111 feet on Washington. It will be thoroughly modern in every particular and will not only improve the street but will remove a fire danger.

The building is to be erected in two sections in order to accommodate the Wharton Brothers implement business. As soon as the first half is completed the business will be moved into the temporary quarters while the second half is built. The entire building will be occupied by the implement firm when completed. Plans for the building were drawn by Architect F. E. Alley, who has designed not only a very comfortable building but one that will make a fine appearance.

STATE CLEANINGS AND NEWS ABOUT PEOPLE WE KNOW

CORVALLIS.—Japanese barnyard millet, by its ability to produce a crop in the dry weeks of late summer in Oregon coast counties, sets its first test this year by many drymen, reports the college extension service. Some 40 demonstrations have been arranged by county agents in Clatsop, Tillamook, Lincoln, Douglas and Columbia counties. An acre of millet yielded 14 tons of green feed on the John Jacob Astor experiment station at Astoria. The average yield there since 1916, when the crop was first grown in an experimental way, is about 13 tons. Fed at the rate of 20 pounds per cow each day, an acre will carry 30 cows for one month. The crop is usually harvested between August 15 and September 15, when pastured and dry and succulent at a premium.

SALEM.—A celebration was held Monday in honor of the birthday of W. A. Cray, father of J. B. Cray, guests gathered at the Cray home before going to the state hospital grounds to inspect the gardens.

REEDSFORT.—Beginning on Tuesday evening three full shifts of workmen were put to work with the road shovel employed upon the Empqua highway near Reedsport, according to the recent announcement of Olaf Hammer, engineer in charge of the Reedsport construction company. From now until the completion of the contract, the three full shifts will be employed and the roadway finished by the contract time, which is given as August 1st.

Even with all the available methods at hand, the company will be pressed for time, it is declared. Every moment will be needed to clear the debris from the way and to make the surface fit for travel.

SILVERSIDE SALMON RUN EARLIER THAN USUAL.

REEDSFORT, Ore., July 12.—The first catch of fall silversides, a species of salmon found in the coast rivers, was caught 15 miles off shore from the Empqua river Sunday by George Pete and Ralph Hand, operating the outside trolling boat Anna. Over one ton, including a few halibut and link cod, was included in the catch. Usually the fall silversides reach the Empqua river about the first of October, but the Anna struck this school.

It is surmised that a change in the Japanese current caused them to reach here about 70 days in advance of their usual run.
