COURT REFUSES TO DIRECT VERDICT IN JAPANESE ACTION

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PORTLAND, Ore., July 15.—Defendants in the damage suit growing out of the deportation of Japanese from the Pacific Spruce corporations mills at Toledo a year ago, will proceed with their testimony in federal court tomorrow, a recess being taken today on account of naturalization cases in Walverton overruled a motion for.

When the plaintiffs case was rested yesterday, Federal Judge Walverton overruled a motion for a directed verdict in favor of Mrs. Rosemary Schenk, one of the defendants, and a similar motion in favor of all the defendants.

Mrs. I. Kawamoto testified late yesterday that seven white men broke the door of her home and threw her husband to the ground and kicked him. Her husband was taken away and she thought he was killed, but he returned.

Mrs. M. Altred testified she saw a pistol in the hands of one of the men who raided the Japanese quarters at the Pacific Spruce corporations mills. She repeated profane epithets which she said she heard white men use against the Japanese. Mrs. James Burns of Eddyville, formerly of Toledo, gave somewhat similar testimony.

Henry C. Prichard, one of the defendants, first witness for the defense, declared the Pacific Spruce corporation had boycotted his store and discharged employees that traded with him.

INDIANAPOLIS, July 15.—(A. P.)—Over an undulating carpet of green, splashed with traps and bunkers, and cut by a stream and ravines, stretching 6,559 yards from the first tee to the eighteenth green, will be played the western open golf tournament, August 28, 27 and 28. The Highland Golf and Country Club of Indianapolis will be host to the event.

To attain a par of 70 on the course requires almost perfect control of every shot. A record of 68 was made last year by Leonard Schmutte, young Fort Wayne, Ind., professional, but the course since has been lengthened.

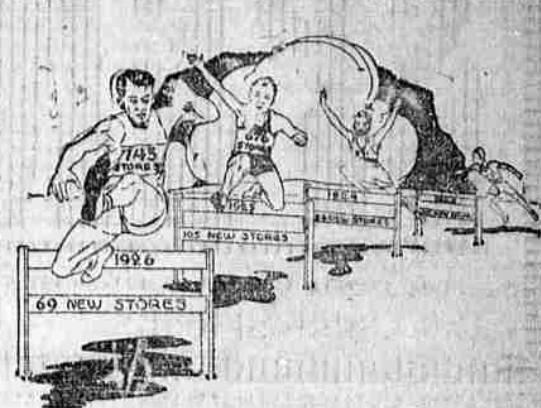
OFFERS CUP

GRAIN CONDITION PRECLUDES GREAT LOSS FROM RUST

MINNEAPOLIS, July 15.—The Northwest very likely will escape heavy losses from grain rust this year, says an announcement today from the northwest society for the prevention of grain rust.

"The present advanced condition of the grain," the announcement states, "rules out any real rust loss this year, even though the rust becomes very heavy in some of the southern part of the state, enjoying their annual vacation. "Black stem rust, which is fostered by the common hardy bush every spring, needs moisture as well as heat to grow and multiply rapidly. The drought this spring held the rust in check and only a small amount was present in the grain fields, until a short time ago."
