FIRE ON ST. JOHNS CREEK MAKES BIG SPREAD OVER NIGHT

Three more incendiary fires on St. Johns Creek, spreading with terrific rapidity, have burned over 2,000 acres of standing timber in that vicinity, according to the report made today by Supervising Forester H. G. Brown. The three fires started on one of the three miles front and have covered 23 sections of land. The burning community around Milo were threatened last night but the fire now has been turned from them. Twenty men are holding the fire in check, but it is not yet under control. The forest service reports the spread of the fire checked, while the back head fire is thought to be under control. The forest service is retaining present crews but is hiring no more men.
