There was a dramatic scene in the office of Count Bethlen, premier of Hungary, a few days ago, when Jeremiah Smith, the American economist who has managed the finances of that country for two years with brilliant success, declined to accept \$100,000 in compensation for his service. Nor would he take a high decoration, either. He preferred the friendship and gratitude of those people to any gifts, and he wanted the money given to the poor people of that country, as they needed it more than he did. This would be a quite different world if there were more people in it like Mr. Smith. We need a lot of those folks doing public work in this country. Fortunately, there are a good many such who can be named, but there is room for a large additional number. That man will get more happiness out of the affection that those poor people over there will feel for him than \$100,000 or any possible sum could give him. The way is open for such deeds in our own country.

President Coolidge, it is reported, is to try fishing again in the Adirondacks, which will be some new sport for him, as he has not fished since he was a boy and angled in the streams of his native Vermont. What luck he will have is not quite clear. Anyway, it is not probable that he will scare the fish away by talking too much. Many statesmen have enjoyed fishing. It is a philosophical sport, which takes up a man's mind, distracts him from heavy cares, and at the same time it permits him to do some thinking about big things if he wants to. The calm peace of remote lakes and rivers steals into a man's mind, and a multitude of men have returned from such excursions better fitted to do their work.

An astonishing manifestation of the tendency of some people to commit acts of vandalism, has been given in New York city, where it is reported that 800 shrubs and 250 young trees were recently destroyed by vandals in Central park. They were stripped of their boughs or else pulled up by the roots. There are some people who do not seem to know how to act in a democratic country. They are or could be partners in the business of creating a fine country, but they are not satisfied unless they destroy what someone else has created. Some of these people have been seen near New York city.

Many observers think the free use of the family automobile is the thing that starts the flappers of both sexes on their unconventional doings. If so, the parents are in most cases to blame. They can refuse the use of the cars, unless they feel sure young people will behave while they have them. Henry N.—If you forward a self-addressed, stamped envelope and request the formula for the pilocarpine hair tonic, I will be glad to send it to you.

Mrs. B. S.—A cream made from fine vegetable oils will cross the tendency to grow hair. You should use such a cream and massage all the tissues with it that have been impaired through the treatments you received. Continue to do this daily until the muscles have recovered their firmness again. The ice rubs or cold water applications should end the treatment.

Extract the coarse hairs with tweezers and the rest of them will not be noticed.

Miss J. C.—Thank you for your interesting suggestion. You can bleach the hair and also whiten the skin on your arms by using peroxide several times a week.

Miss B. C. S. H.—One of the best exercises for reducing the abdomen is taken by lying flat on your back on the floor, and then without the aid of your arms or elbows, rising to a sitting position. At first it will be necessary to place the tips of the toes under a heavy piece of furniture to brace the muscles, but such help should be discarded as soon as possible and depend entirely upon the muscles of the abdomen for support.
