

GIRL'S MURDER IS BEING PROBED BY JURY AT BOSTON

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
BOSTON, July 16.—While special detectives, the police and inspectors from the district attorney's office today hunted for Thomas E. Walsh, disbarred physician, on charges of murder in connection with the death of Edith Green, 19-year-old state ward, a special grand jury was called to investigate the discovery of her dismembered body in Mattapan last Tuesday.

The girl's sweetheart, James V. Ford, was at liberty under bond of \$2,000 following his arrest and confession that Walsh performed an illegal operation on the girl at his request for a fee of \$150. Ford is charged with being an accessory before and after the crime.

A second doctor thought to have aided in dismembering the body and attempting to hide it, was still being sought by the police.

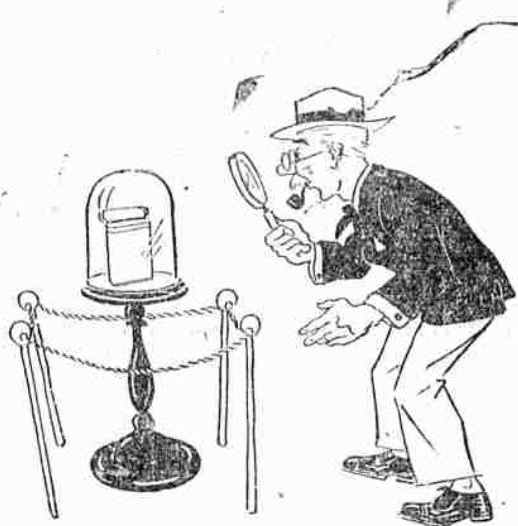

BILLS FOR BALLOT BEING ARGUED IN SUPREME COURT

SALEM, Ore., July 16.—The Jackson court house case, an original proceeding in mandamus to compel the county clerk of Jackson county to place on the November ballot a proposal to move the court house from Jacksonville to Medford, will be argued in the supreme court today. The suit is a friendly case to test out the question whether the signatures of 15 per cent or 60 per cent of the voters are required on the petitions.

The case of Josephine Othman against Secretary of State Kozar, an original mandamus proceeding to force the secretary of state to place on the ballot the housewives' council hydroelectric bill, will also be argued today. The petitioners claim the petitions contain sufficient signatures, while the secretary of state, on the basis of an opinion of the attorney general, holds that they were short about one thousand names.

Another case to be argued today is that of Frank Keeler against District Attorney Stanley Myers and Sheriff Hurlburt of Multnomah county, an effort to enjoin the officials from using as evidence in a case against Keeler certain securities that were seized in a raid on his office. The case grows out of the arrest of Keeler in connection with the Oregon bond issue.

DISCOURAGED AT 41, PORTLANDER GOES GAS ROUTE

PORTLAND, Ore., July 16.—Sam S. Coney, 41, Oregon Electric company employee, turned on the gas early today in his home and ended his life.

Before inhaling the gas he telephoned his sister, Mrs. A. S. Coney, telling her he was too discouraged to attempt to continue living. She and her husband rushed to the house, where they met two policemen, who crashed through the front door, to find Coney seated in the kitchen, a rubber tube in his mouth connected to the gas range.

His heart still beat so police dragged him to the porch and summoned a physician, while they worked over him in an effort to effect resuscitation.

A pulmonologist was taken to the home by the fire bureau, but it had no effect. He is survived by his wife and a 16-year-old son, Len.

MARKET RATINGS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
BOSTON, July 16.—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"There has been no pronounced action in the wool market as yet, on account of either the local openings of light weight goods or the opening of the fourth series of colonial wool auctions in London. In each case, prices have opened a little lower than had been

expected but not enough so as to demoralize the trade, on the contrary, certain phases of both openings tend to stability and are reassuring. Merinos at London, compared with last spring, are firm. Capes about five per cent dearer and cross-breds par to five per cent down, the latter due entirely to the British coal strike.

"In the eastern seaboard markets, business has been less active but prices are steady throughout the list, as against a week ago. In the west, prices are very firm even against the buyer and the new clip for the country as a whole is figured to be 85 per cent cleared either by sale or commitment.

"Reports from the goods market show more interest than for some time in goods and the belief in general that prices are at the bottom which, with a guarantee by the big factor against further reduction, naturally should tend to good business and apparently some good orders have been taken already.

"Mohair is rather quiet but very firm.
